1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To consider and determine this application for a variation to the premises licence for Peterborough International Food Centre, 314 - 316 Lincoln Road, Peterborough, PE1 2ND taking into account the representations received from responsible authorities and other persons.

2. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 2.1 On the 6th August 2009 an application for a new premises licence application at 314 316 Lincoln Road, Peterborough, was submitted to the Licensing Authority by Mr Riad Ahmed. This licence was granted as there were no representations received. Since the granting of this licence there has been three changes of licence holders and two changes of designated premises supervisors. The premises has also been known as 'International Supermarket', 'Europol Supermarket', 'Express Booze Market' and is currently known as 'Peterborough International Food Centre. A copy of the current premises licence can be found at **APPENDIX B PAGE 27**.
- 2.2 Since 18 April 2013 the Licensing Authority has adopted a special policy relating to the cumulative impact in respect to all licensed premises within the 'Operation Can Do' area. An explanation of what this special policy entails can be found on page 8 of the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy. A map showing the Can Do area is attached at Appendix B Page 45.
- 2.3 The premises falls within the 'Operation Can Do' area and is therefore subject to the provisions of the special 'cumulative impact' policy.
- **2.4** The variation application was advertised correctly as per current guidelines.

.

3. VARIATION APPLICATION AND ADDITIONAL CONDITIONS PROPOSED

- i) To increase the hours authorised to sell alcohol from 8am until 2am. The premises is currently authorised to sell alcohol Sunday to Thursday 8am to Midnight and 8am until 2am on Fridays and Saturdays;
- ii) To add the condition '8 CCTV cameras will be in place and be visible from behind the counter':
- iii) To add the condition ' 5 Fire alarms and fire exits will be in place";
- iv) To add the condition 'Rubbish will be removed'; and
- v) To add the condition 'The Challenge 25 age policy and a refusal book will be in place'.

4. REPRESENTATIONS

- 4.1 Representations against the application have been received from Cambridgeshire Constabulary, Peterborough City Council Planning Department, the Local Health Authority and Peterborough City Council's Noise Pollution Team in their capacity of responsible authorities. We also received a representation from a Peterborough resident in their capacity as an 'other person'. The representations are made against the licensing objectives of 'crime and disorder' and 'public nuisance'. These representations are attached at Appendix B Page 30 and summarised at 5.1.
- 4.2 It is for members of the licensing sub-committee to decide to attach whatever weight to the documentation that it sees fit. Regulation 19(a) of the hearing regulations require authorities to disregard any information given by a party or person that is not relevant to the application. Members should note that the letters and documentation attached are in their entirety and not all matters raised within the representations are relevant matters for consideration under the Licensing Act 2003. It is up to the committee to decide upon what weight they attach to these areas.
- 4.3 Representations have not been received from any other of the Responsible Authorities i.e. Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service, The Licensing Authority, Peterborough Trading Standards, Peterborough City Council Health and Safety Team and Peterborough City Council Child Protection. There were no representations in support of the application.

8. LEGAL OFFICER'S COMMENTS

- 8.1 The Licensing Authority (hereafter referred to as 'the Council') is charged with implementing the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. This is an application for the variation of a premises licence made under Section 34 of the Licensing Act.
- **8.2** In this case, the application was received at these offices on 16th October 2013.
- **8.3** The application before this committee will be treated on its own merits, and the Licensing committee will make its decision based upon:
 - The merits of the application;
 - The promotion of the four licensing objectives;
 - The statement of policy of the Licensing Authority; and
 - The Guidance issued by the Home Office in April 2012 under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 8.4 The licensing authority may determine the application, depending upon what is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, in any of the following ways:
 - decide to grant or vary the licence in the same terms as it was applied for;
 - decide to grant or vary the licence, but to modify or add conditions (to promote the licensing objectives):
 - exclude from the scope of the licence a licensable activity; and
 - decide to refuse to vary the licence.
- 8.5 Conditions are modified if they are altered, omitted or any new condition added (Section 35(4) Licensing Act 2003.

LICENSING ACT 2003 GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Note: In this document, the following definitions are included to provide an explanation of certain terms included in the Act. In some cases they are an abbreviation of what is stated in the Licensing Act 2003 or an interpretation of those terms. For a full definition of the terms used, the reader must refer to the Licensing Act 2003.

'Child'

- a) means an individual aged under 16
- b) a child is unaccompanied if he is not in the company of an individual aged 18 years or over

DCMS Department for Culture Media and Sport

'Designated Premises Supervisor' means the person (who must be a Personal Licence Holder), in the case of premises selling alcohol, who will normally have been given the day to day responsibility for running the premises by the holder of the Premises Licence or will be the Premises Licence holder.

'Other Persons' means persons who live, or are involved in a business, in the relevant Licensing Authorities area and who are likely to be affected by the application and are not a Responsible Authority.

'Late Night Refreshment' means the supply of hot food or hot drink to members of the public (whether for consumption on or off the premises) between the hours of 11.00 pm and 5.00 am.

'Licensable Activities' means: -

- The sale by retail of alcohol
- The supply of alcohol by or on behalf of a club to, or to the order of, a member of the club
- The provision of Regulated Entertainment
- The provision of Late Night Refreshment

'Licensing Authority' is the licensing function of Peterborough City Council

'Licensed Premises' includes club premises and events unless the context otherwise requires.

'Licensing Objectives'

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm

'Operating Schedule' means a document containing a statement of the following matters (and any others that may be prescribed): -

- The relevant Licensable Activities
- The times at which the Licensable Activities are to take place and any other times when premises are open to the public
- Information regarding the person who will be specified in the Premises Licence as the Premises Supervisor
- Where the Licensable Activities involve the supply of alcohol, whether it is for the supply on and/or off the premises
- The steps being taken to promote the Licensing Objectives

'Rateable Value' as regards a premises, is the value for the time being in force for the premises entered in the local non-domestic rating list for the purposes of Part III of the Local Government Finance Act 1988(b).

'Regulated Entertainment' (Schedule 1 of the Act) means: -

- A performance of a play
- · An exhibition of a film
- An indoor sporting event
- · A boxing or wrestling entertainment
- A performance of live music
- Any playing of recorded music
- A performance of dance

Or entertainment of a similar description falling within the last three of the categories listed above, where the entertainment takes place in the presence of and for the purposes of entertaining that audience or spectators.

'Relevant Licensing Authority' is the Authority in the area the premises are situated.

'Responsible Authority' means any of the following: -

- Cambridgeshire Constabulary (The Chief Officer of Police)
- Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue (The Fire Authority)
- Health and Safety Team, Peterborough City Council
- Planning authority, Peterborough City Council
- Trading Standards, Peterborough City Council
- Environmental Health Pollution, Peterborough City Council
- Children's' Services Child Protection & Review Manager
- Primary Care Trust or Local Health Board (Director of Public Health)
- The Relevant Licensing Authority, Peterborough City Council
- Maritime & Coastguard Agency, Walton on Naze. (For vessels carrying more than 12 passengers.)
- Environment Agency, Peterborough (For vessels carrying 12 or less passengers).

'Supply of alcohol'

- the sale by retail of alcohol, or
- the supply of alcohol by or on behalf of a club to, or to the order of, a member of the club.

'Temporary Event Notice' means a Permitted Temporary Activity involving one or more Licensable Activities subject to the following various conditions and limitations: -

- Duration they are limited to events lasting for up to 168 hours (7 days);
- Scale they cannot involve the presence of more than 499 people at any one time;
- Use of the same premises the same premises cannot be used on more than 12 occasions in a calendar year, but are subject to the overall aggregate of 21 days irrespective of the number of occasions on which they have been used; and
- The number of notices given by an individual within a given period of time a Personal Licence Holder is limited to 50 notices in one year and another person to 5 notices in a similar period.

(In any other circumstances, a full Premises Licence or Club Premises Certificate will be required for the period of the event).

On 30th October 2013 Cambridgeshire Constabulary Licensing Department (Peterborough District) received e-mail notification from Peterborough City Council Licensing Authority of an application to vary a Premises License at Express Booze Market, 314 – 316 Lincoln Road, Peterborough, PE1 2ND. The application has been submitted by Mr. Langford Smith of 227 Park Road, Peterborough, PE1 2UL on behalf of and acting as agent for the Premises License Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) Mr. ISMAIL AKDOGAN of 88 Star Road, Peterborough, PE1 5HQ. Mr. Akdogan holds a Personal License, reference: LBH-PER-N-1723, which was issued by the London Borough of Hackney. The application, seeks to extend the licensable sale of alcohol from midnight to 02:00 hrs Monday to Thursday.

Express Booze Market has a current premises license issued by the Local Authority (Reference 066651) which only permits the licensed activity of 'Sale by Retail of Alcohol' 'Off Premises', and authorises the sale of such alcohol from Sunday to Thursday between 08:00 hrs and midnight and from Friday to Saturday between 08:00 hrs and 02:00 hrs.

Express Booze Market is located centrally within the CAN-DO Operational area, on Lincoln Road and ultimately central of the Cumulative Impact Area (Special Policy) drawn up and adopted on 18th April 2013. It has been positively identified that there is a significant concentration of licensed premises within the CAN-DO area, specifically local to Express Booze Market and there is sufficient evidence of a negative impact on the statutory objectives. Peterborough City Council's 'Statement of Licensing Policy', 'Special Policy on Cumulative Effect' - Paragraph 11.6 states:

"This special policy creates a rebuttable presumption that applications within the Op Can Do area for new premises or club premises certificates or <u>variations</u> that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, if relevant representations are received about the cumulative impact on the licensing objectives, unless the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced".

Para 11.7 states:

"Applications will need to address the special policy issues in their operating schedules in order to rebut such a presumption".

The variation in this case – extending the licensable hours of the sale of alcohol until 02:00 hours – in my professional opinion as the Cambridgeshire Constabulary Licensing Officer for Peterborough District this application is likely to add to the existing cumulative impact. Unfortunately no formal demonstration by the applicant or his representative have been received that would satisfactorily demonstrate that the application, if granted, would **not contribute** towards the cumulative impact already being experienced.

The formal application (L4) part P states:

"Describe any additional steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives as a result of the proposed variation".

I believe that this has not been addressed satisfactorily despite suitable advice and assistance being given to the applicant and his agent. The application merely offers 'More consistent opening hours'. I would suggest that if the Special Policy received any form of consideration by the applicant he could have demonstrated his intentions more thoroughly. The applicant wants to make the opening hours 'more consistent', and I offer that being armed with the negative impact that alcohol currently has on this community I would recommend consideration be given to reducing the hours back to midnight on a daily basis. This application could be seen by the communities who are raising concerns as an attempt to capitalise on the adverse issues locally in the name of profit.

Express Booze Market is a large Off Licenses in the CAN-DO area. It consists of about 80% alcohol stock and 20% non-alcoholic goods and consumables. The store area at the rear of the shop comprises of 100% alcohol stock. The Licensee has a considerable stock of beer, larger and cider in single measures over 6.5% Abv and up to 11%, and a significant stock hold of two litre bottles of alcohol beverage under the name of cider. It can be evidenced that high strength alcohol primarily appeals to those who have adverse problematic issues with alcohol such as street drinkers or alcoholics. Both of which unfortunately continue to affect the local community on a daily basis and particular into the latter part of the day / night.

Whilst reviewing this application I have also reviewed the Premises License. I am surprised and disappointed to find that the License does not have many conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule and none relevant to the licensing objectives of Preventing Crime and Disorder and Preventing Public Nuisance. Such conditions would assist the licensee with operating his premises in line with the licensing objectives.

Cambridgeshire Constabulary do not support this application and appeal to the Licensing sub-committee to seriously consider the Special Policy and reject the application. Should a rejection of the application be considered as unsuitable in this case and the application is granted, may I ask that the following conditions are added to the license to support the licensee in upholding the Licensing Objectives.

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder:

- CCTV will be provided in the form of a recordable system, capable of providing
 pictures of evidential quality in all lighting conditions in particular facial recognition.
 Cameras shall encompass all entrances and exits to the premises, fire exits and all
 area where the sale / supply of alcohol occur. A camera will be positioned outside the
 premises covering the shop frontage.
- 2. CCTV equipment must be maintained in good working order, be correctly time and date stamped. Recordings must be kept in date order, numbered sequentially and kept for a period of 28 days.
- 3. The Premises License Holder must ensure at all times a Designated Premises Supervisor or appointed member of staff is capable and competent at downloading

- CCTV footage in a recordable format and hand this footage over to the Police / Local Authority on demand.
- 4. The recording equipment and discs / usb pen drives shall be kept in a secure environment under the control of the DPS or other responsible named individual.
- 5. An operational daily log report must be maintained endorsed by signature, indicating the system has been checked and is compliant, in the event of any failings of the system actions taken are to be recorded.
- 6. In the event of a technical failure of the CCTV equipment the Premises License Holder / Designated Premises Supervisor must report the failure to the Police or local authority immediately.
- 7. Notices advising that CCTV has been installed on the premises shall be posted so that they are clearly visible to the public within the licensed premises.
- 8. Staff training in relation to identifying and preventing sales of alcohol to any person who is, or appears to be drunk should be undertaken on a monthly basis. This training, together with on-going training to prevent underage sales (Challenge 25) should be recorded in a written format and be available to an authorised officer upon demand.
- 9. A refusals log will be maintained on a daily basis recording all refused attempted purchases of alcohol, carried out by drunks or underage persons.
- 10. A Personal License Holder (APLH) will be on the premises at all times the sale by retail of alcohol takes place.
- 11. No Beer, Lager or Cider above 6.5% Abv (alcohol content) will be offered for sale in the premises.
- 12. No alcoholic drinks will be purchased by the store owners or staff from sellers calling at the store.
- 13. All invoices (originals or copies) for all alcoholic goods for retail sale on the premises will be kept at the licensed premises and made available to Police, Council and HMRC Officers upon request.
- 14. A strict stock control system will be introduced so that the licensee can quickly identify where and when alcoholic drinks have been purchased.
- 15. A ultra-violet light will be available and maintained at the store for the purpose of checking the UK Duty Stamp on all spirits as soon as practical after they have been purchased.
- 16. If any spirits bought by the company have UK Duty Stamps that do not fluoresce under ultra-violet light, or are otherwise suspicious, the licensee shall identify the supplier to the Trading Standards department and HMRC as soon as possible.

Promote Public Safety -

- 17. An adequate and appropriate supply of first aid equipment and materials shall be available on the premises.
- 18. Valid Public liability Insurance shall be kept in force and a copy of the schedule shall be available for inspection by an authorised officer on request.

19. No person will be allowed to enter or leave the premises with an open vessel of alcohol and the licensee will actively discourage and prevent anyone congregating or drinking outside the premises.

In respect of the application to vary the existing licence for the above premises, Pollution Control note that the applicant suggests "rubbish removal" will be a step aimed at the prevention of public nuisance. We would therefore suggest the following conditions be added to the licence with this in mind:

- a) An adequate number of suitable (lidded) receptacles shall be provided to receive and store refuse from the premises/site.
- b) Any litter or refuse generated must be contained within the boundaries of the premises and regularly cleared.
- c) Receptacles for waste shall be emptied regularly to avoid causing a public nuisance through smells or odours and shall be maintained in a clean condition.

Thank you for sending us a copy of this license application. The application is to extend sale of alcohol from midnight on Monday – Thursday to 2.00am. We note that this application relates to premises in the "Operation CAN-Do" area which is now subject to a Cumulative Impact Policy (CIP).

We have particular concerns for the area in terms of problems relating to alcohol. Public Health supports the partnership approach to concerns for community cohesion and anti-social behaviour. We have seen police data showing crime and ASB to take place late into the evening in the Operation CAN-Do neighbourhood and our own analysis shows the area to have the highest density of licensed outlets in the city already. Despite recent improvements thanks to a number of measures, alcohol-related hospital admissions from wards in the area remain among the highest for any neighbourhood in Peterborough, which already suffers a rate higher than the national average.

The CIP area enjoys a particularly diverse population, including many from other European Union states and World Health Organisation data shows considerably higher rates of liver cirrhosis among people from Lithuania, Latvia, Poland and Portugal than the UK average. We believe it is important that we strive to reduce alcohol-related harm among all people living in our city. We had hoped that "health" would become an objective under the Licensing Act, as previously envisaged by the government's National Alcohol Strategy launched in 2012.

We supported the development the CIP for the area which we believe makes an important contribution to health and wellbeing, community cohesion and crime and disorder reduction in the Operation CAN-Do neighbourhood. While the current licensing system does not allow for objection purely on the grounds of health, we oppose the application on the grounds of the indisputable link between alcohol and crime and disorder:

The National Alcohol Strategy (2012) estimates that annually in a community with Peterborough's population:

- 1,800 people will be a victim of alcohol-related violent crime;
- Over 700 11-15 year olds will be drinking weekly;
- Over 23,000 people will binge-drink.

Nationally we know that:

- 47% of violent offenders are believed to be under the influence of alcohol, rising to 62% in incidents of 'stranger' violence;
- 32% of young people surveyed reported being under the influence of alcohol when committing criminal damage offences (NICE, 2010);
- 40% of all sexual assaults are estimated to have taken place when the offender has been under the influence of alcohol, and 30% where the victim has been drinking; and
- Studies in America have shown alcohol is behind up to 73% of domestic abuse incidents. Research in the UK is showing that where alcohol is involved the severity of the assault is worse (Alcohol Concern, 2010).

In our region Peterborough has the highest rate of alcohol offences per thousand population, at 9.62. The cost of crime and antisocial behaviour linked to alcohol in England is estimated to be £8 billion (NICE, 2010). Analysis of these costs for Peterborough leads us to believe the annual cost of alcohol-related crime and antisocial behaviour to be in the region of £10m. We consider licensing legislation to be an important contributor to reducing harm by restricting availability and safeguarding the public, including the young and vulnerable.

As a result, we do not see how the extension of hours of selling alcohol in the Millfield area to 2.00am Monday – Thursday serves the intention of the CIP to reduce the risk of alcohol-related crime and anti-social behaviour and the promotion of community cohesion. We therefore oppose this license application in the Cumulative Impact Policy area.




