Revised drawings have been submitted showing the 1<sup>st</sup> floor windows of the eastern elevation as obscure glazed, therefore the submission element of Condition 3 may be removed.

Cllr Allen has NOT objected to the application.

Since the Committee Report was drafted officers have received the following comments from the applicant with regards to English Heritage's Consultation Response. The applicants argue that despite the evidence, English Heritage seem unwilling to accept that other options including retention of Gayhurst building have been considered. They argue that the evidence has been prepared by leading experts in the Peterborough property market and reiterate that a part refurbishment, part new build is not viable. The applicant states that PPS5 is clear that where retention is not viable then a well designed new building which recognizes the setting and enhance the area should be granted planning permission. The applicant states that the public benefit is in affordable housing and bringing a site that is in real danger of becoming vacant back into a sustainable economic use.

Since the Committee Report was drafted the Highway Officers have asked that the following condition be added to the consent should members be minded to approve.

No dwelling shall be occupied until the roads and footways connecting that dwelling to the existing public highway have been completed to base course level.

Reason: In the interests of Highway safety, in accordance with Policies T1, T3, T5, T7 and T8 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

The Local Planning Authority has received a further letter of objection from a local resident. The resident has concerns that the proposal is to build 34 dwellings to house low income families in an established crime area which the police have been unable to control. The local resident states that 80 Lincoln Road is in the middle of what is known as the Bermuda Triangle, which stretches from Burghley Road, down Lincoln Road, Park Road, crossed over by Church Walk

and Manor House Street where Peterborough's Criminal Gangs control and operate strings of Drug Dealers and Prostitutes.

Page 52 - The owner of the Orton Centre notes that the proposal involves some of its land and it would welcome discussions with the Council in respect of the future plans for the area and the Centre.

<u>The Local Highway Authority</u> raises no objection subject to the addition of the following conditions and informatives:-

### **Conditions:**

1. Lighting shall be arranged so that no danger or inconvenience is caused to users of the adjoining public highways. Details of the proposed lighting shall be submitted to the Local Planning Authority and approved in writing prior to its first use.

Reason: To avoid glare/dazzle which could lead to danger to highway users, in accordance with Policy T1 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

- 2. The building shall not be occupied until the service yard area shown on the approved plan (C1400 Rev A) has been drained and surfaced in accordance with details submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority, and that area shall not thereafter be used for any purpose other than for the turning, loading and unloading of vehicles delivering to the new building.
  - Reason: In the interest of Highway safety, in accordance with Policy T1 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).
- 3. Prior to commencement of development of the relocated Grounds Maintenance Depot, a plan detailing the proposed areas for the parking (including cycle parking), turning, loading and unloading areas within the new depot has been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. The new depot shall not be brought into use until these areas have been provided on site. Reason: In the interests of highway safety, in accordance with Policies T1, T9, T10 and T11 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).
- 4. The new building shall not be brought into use until space has been laid out within the site for vehicles to turn so that they may enter and leave the site in forward gear, and that area shall not thereafter be used for any purpose other than the turning of vehicles.

Reason: In the interest of Highway safety, in accordance with Policy T1 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

5. Prior to commencement of development, a scheme for the provision of cycle parking (for staff, students and visitors) including the types and locations of the stands and shelters, shall be submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority.

The new buildings shall not be occupied until these cycle parking areas have been laid out within the site in accordance with the approved details, and those areas shall not thereafter be used for any purpose other than the parking of cycles.

Reason: In order to protect and safeguard the amenity of the local residents or occupiers, in accordance with Policy T9 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

- 6. Prior to the commencement of the works on-site (either construction or demolition), a Construction Management Plan and a Demolition Management Plan shall be submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. These documents shall include amongst other matters:
  - a noise management plan including a scheme for the monitoring of construction and demolition noise:
  - a scheme for the control of dust arising from building, demolition and site works:
  - a scheme of chassis and wheel cleaning for construction and demolition vehicles including contingency measures should these facilities become inoperative and a scheme for the cleaning of affected public highways;
  - a scheme of working hours for construction, demolition and other site works:
  - a scheme for construction and demolition access from the Parkway system, including measures to ensure that all construction or demolition vehicles can enter the site immediately upon arrival, adequate space within the site to enable vehicles to park, turn, load and unload clear of the public highway and details of any haul routes across the site;
  - a scheme for parking of contractors vehicles;
  - · a scheme for access and deliveries including hours.

The development shall thereafter be carried out in accordance with the approved plans, unless otherwise agreed in writing with the Local Planning Authority.

Reason: In the interests of highway safety and residential amenity in accordance with policies T1 and DA2 of the Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

7. The new buildings shall not be occupied until the vehicular accesses have been constructed in accordance with the approved plans.

Reason: In the interests of Highway safety, in accordance with Policy T1 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

- 8. The building shall not be occupied until a means of access for pedestrians and cyclists has been constructed in accordance with the approved plans.
  - Reason: In the interests of Highway safety, in accordance with Policies T3 and T5 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).
- 9. Development shall not begin until details of the junctions between the proposed service/access roads and the highway have been approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority; and the buildings shall not be brought into use until those junctions have been constructed in accordance with the approved details.

Reason: In the interests of Highway safety, in accordance with Policies T1, T3, T5 and T8 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

10. Visibility splays clear of any obstruction over a height of 600mm above verge level shall be provided on either side of the junction of the proposed service/access roads with the public highway. The minimum dimensions to provide the required splay lines shall be 2m measured along the centre line of the proposed access road from its junction with the channel line of the public highway, and 60m measured along the channel line of the public highway from the centre line of the proposed access road. (N.B. The channel line comprises the edge of the carriageway or the line of the face of the kerbs on the side of the existing highway nearest the new access).

Reason: In the interests of Highway safety, in accordance with Policies T1, T3, T5 and T8 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

11. If gates are to be provided to the vehicular accesses they should be set back from the edge of the carriageway. The set back for the emergency service access and the maintenance depot must be 11m (i.e. the highway boundary), and the set back for the service yard access must be 15m.

Reason: In the interests of Highway safety, in accordance with Policy T1 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

12. The Grounds Maintenance Depot access road and the Emergency Services access road shall be of a minimum width of 5m from the edge of the existing carriageway to the highway boundary. The service yard access road must be a minimum width of 6m for a distance of 15m from the edge of the existing carriageway.

Reason: In the interests of Highway safety, in accordance with Policies T1 and T8 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

13. The visibility splays as shown on the approved plan (SK1022) at the junction of the access roads with the public highway shall be provided before the commencement of the development.

Reason: In the interests of Highway safety, in accordance with Policies T1 and T8 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

14. Before the new accesses are brought into use, visibility splays shall be provided on both sides of the accesses and shall be maintained thereafter free from any obstruction over a height of 600mm within an area of 2m x 2m measured from and along respectively the highway boundary.

Reason: In the interests of Highway safety, in accordance with Policies T1 and T8 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

15. Prior to commencement of development, a scheme for the required off-site highways works shall be submitted to and approved by the Local Planning Authority. The submitted scheme shall include all construction details, tying into existing and proposed carriageways/cycleways/pedestrian routes and appropriate street lighting, signing and lining.

The main elements to the scheme will include (but not exclusively):-

- Bushfield Square Works
  - Two new pedestrian/cycle priority crossings.
  - New heavy-duty vehicle crossing to serve the service yard.
  - Widening the footpath/cycle route through the centre of Bushfield Square to a minimum of 3m width.
- New heavy duty vehicular crossings to provide access from the Bushfield busway to the new Grounds Maintenance Depot and the Emergency Access to the Ormiston Bushfield Academy.
- Provision of a new 3m wide shared-use footpath/cycleway from the southern corner of Bushfield Square, alongside the Sports Centre then southeast through the new 'landscaped plaza' area to connect with the existing 5m

wide segregated footpath/cycleway to the south of the new All Weather Pitch/MUGA.

- Provision of a new 5m wide shared-use footpath/cycleway from the southern corner of the Sports Centre (connecting to the 3m footpath/cycleway), north east across the new 'landscaped plaza' area to connect to the existing 5m wide segregated footpath/cycleway, to replace the area being stopped-up.
- Re-contouring and resurfacing of the existing 5m wide segregated footpath/cycleway to create a 5m wide shared-use footpath cycleway.
- Provision of a new 5m wide shared-use footpath/cycleway around the eastern and northern sides of the new All Weather Pitch/MUGA to replace the existing 5m wide segregated route that is to be stopped up.

Reason: In the interests of highway safety, and to promote the use of sustainable modes of travel, in accordance with Policies T1, T3, T4 and T5 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

16. No works to remove the existing footpath/cycleway within the site shall commence until the replacement footpath/cycleway has been constructed and is opened for use.

Reason: In the interests of highway safety, in accordance with Policies T1, T3 and T5 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

17. The development shall not be occupied until the required amendments to the Traffic Regulation Orders on Bushfield, the Bushfield busway and Bushfield Square have been implemented.

Reason: In the interests of highway safety, in accordance with Policy T1 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

### **Informatives:**

1. Vehicular Crossings S184 Access Works Highways Act 1980 - Section 184, Sub-Sections (3)(4)(9)

This development involves the construction of a new or alteration of an existing vehicular crossing within a public highway.

These works **MUST** be carried out in accordance with details specified by Peterborough City Council.

Prior to commencing any works within the public highway, a Road Opening Permit must be obtained from the Council on payment of the appropriate fee.

Contact is to be made with Leanne Bevilacqua on 01733 453499 who will supply the relevant application form, provide a preliminary indication of the fee payable and specify the construction details and drawing(s) required.

### 2. NR&SWA 1991

The development is likely to involve works within the public highway in order to provide services to the site. Such works must be licensed under the New Roads and Street Works Act 1991. It is essential that, prior to the commencement of such works, adequate time be allowed in the development programme for; the issue of the appropriate licence, approval of temporary traffic management and booking of road space. Applications for NR & SWA licences should be made to Peter Brigham – Street Works Coordinator on 01733 453578.

### 3. Off-site Highway Works S278 highway works agreements

The development involves extensive works within the public highway. Such works must be the subject of an agreement under Section 278 of the Highways Act 1980. It is essential that prior to the commencement of the highway works, adequate time is allowed in the development programme for; approval by the council of the designer, main contractor and sub-contractors, technical vetting, safety audits, approval of temporary traffic management, booking of road space for off-site highway and service works and the

completion of the legal agreement. Application forms for S278 agreements are available from Environment, Transport & Engineering - Highway Control Team on 01733 453421.

### 4. New Adoptable Highways S38 road adoption agreements

The attention of the applicant is drawn to the need to make a formal application to the council for an agreement under Section 38 of the Highways Act 1980 if it is the intention that any of the highways proposed as part of this development are to be adopted. Prior to the commencement of the construction of these highways, adequate time must be allowed in the development programme for technical vetting, approval of temporary traffic management, booking of road space for any off-site highway and service works and the completion of the Section 38 agreement. Application forms for Section 38 agreements are available from Environment, Transport & Engineering - Highway Control Team on 01733 453421.

### 5. INF18Wheel Cleansing

### Informative associated with condition 6

The wheel cleansing equipment shall be capable of cleaning the wheels, underside and chassis of the vehicles. The road between the cleaning equipment and the public highway shall be surfaced either in concrete or blacktop and be maintained free of mud, slurry and any other form of contamination whilst in use.

### 6. INF53<u>S148 Penalty for depositing on highway</u> Highways Act 1980 - Section 148, Sub-Section C

It is an offence to deposit anything including building materials or debris on a highway which may cause interruption to any user of the highway (including footways). In the event that a person is found guilty of this offence, a penalty may be imposed in the form of a fine. It is the responsibility of the developer and contractor(s) to ensure that no building materials or debris are placed on or remain within the highway during or after the construction period.

### 7. INF54<u>S149 Penalty for depositing on highway</u> Highways Act 1980 - Section 149

If any thing is so deposited on a highway as to constitute a nuisance, the local authority may by notice require the person who deposited it there to remove it forthwith and if he fails to comply the Local Authority may make a complaint to a Magistrates Court for a Removal and Disposal Order under this Section. In the event that the deposit is considered to constitute a danger, the Local Authority may remove the deposit forthwith and recover reasonable expenses from the person who made the deposit. It is the responsibility of the developer and contractor(s) to ensure that no building materials or debris are placed on or remain within the highway during or after the construction period.

### 8. Stopping-Up Order

### **Informative associated with condition 16**

The works to remove the existing public highway (footpath/cycleway) within the site will require a Stopping-Up Order under Section 247 of the 1990 Town and Country Planning Act. Contact is to be made with the Government Office for the North East for more information.

The scheme will also require a S106 contribution towards the costs of the Traffic Regulation Order and signage. The Local Highway Authority cannot support the stopping-up of the existing footway/cycleway route until the new replacement route has been constructed and is opened for use.

**Sport England** has assessed the proposal against their policy 'A Sporting Future for the Playing Fields of England (1997). Their view is that their playing fields policy can be met provided the replacement provision is secured at Orton Longueville School, thus meeting exception E4 of their playing fields policy. They so not wish to object to the application subject

to the imposition of the following conditions:-

1.Prior to the commencement of development a scheme for the provision of replacement playing fields at Orton Longueville School (of at least the equivalent quantity and quality to that lost to the development) shall be submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Authority, such approval shall be gained by the issue of the Local Planning Authority letter related to the Orton Longueville school redevelopment scheme, in consultation with Sport England. The scheme shall include the processes and methodologies set out in the Sport England publication Natural Turf for Sport (March, 2000). The approved scheme shall include a timetable for the provision of the replacement playing field.

Reason: To ensure that the development does not result in a net los of playing field with regard to policy LT10 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

2. Prior to commencement of the development/use details of the design, technical specification and layout of the proposed 3G All-Weather Pitch, which shall comply with the Football Association's Technical Design Guidance Note 'The FA Guide to Artificial Grass Pitches' (January 2010), where possible and, if applicable, RFU requirements relating to 3G pitches, shall be submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority in consultation with Sport England. The facility shall then be constructed in accordance with the approved design and layout details.

Reason: To ensure the development is fit for purpose, subject to high quality design standards and sustainable and to accord with policy LT10 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

3. Prior to the commencement of the use/development a Community Use Scheme shall be submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. The Scheme shall include details of pricing policy, hours of use, access by non-school users/non-members, management responsibilities and include a mechanism for review. The approved Scheme shall be implemented upon commencement of use of the development.

Reason: To secure well managed safe community access to the sports facility, to ensure sufficient benefit to the development of sport and to accord with policy LT10 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

4. The Synthetic Turf Pitch hereby approved shall only be used between the hours of 0800-2230 (weekdays) and 0900-2230 (weekends), with the floodlights being switched off no later than 15 minutes after the end of this period.

Reason; In the interests of residential amenity, in order to comply with policy DA2 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

<u>Anglian Water</u> comments that under the Water Industry Act 1991 they are obliged to provide water and wastewater infrastructure for new development. To effect this, the applicant will have to make a request to them under the appropriate section of the Water Industry Act.

<u>Wildlife Trust</u> is satisfied with the results of the surveys submitted and the recommendations for mitigation and biodiversity enhancement, and if planning permission is granted these should be secured by planning conditions. The developer will need to avoid any direct disturbance to the County Wildlife Site at Debdale pond during construction, e.g. from movement of vehicles or storage of materials.

**Landscape Officer** is satisfied with the amended proposal to relocate the 6 trees worthy of

retention on site, rather than felling them, to support the overall symmetry principle of the proposal.

The following conditions are recommended:-

- 1. No development or other operations shall commence on site in connection with the new vehicle accesses to the development hereby approved, (including any tree felling, tree pruning, demolition works, soil moving, temporary access construction and or widening, or any operations involving the use of motorised vehicles or construction machinery) until a detailed Arboricultural Implications Assessment, Tree Protection Plan & Arboricultural Method Statement have been submitted to and approved in writing, unless otherwise agreed in writing by the Local Planning Authority. No development or other operations shall take place except in complete accordance with the approved detail. The detail shall include the following:
- 1. Arboricultural Implications Assessment (As per section 6 BS5837-2005)
- 2. Tree Protection Plan (As per section 7.1 BS5837-2005)
- 3. Arboricultural Method Statement (As per section 7.2 BS5837-2005).

Reason: In order to protect and safeguard the amenities of the area, in accordance with Policies LNE9 and LNE10 of the Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

2. No development in respect of the relocation of trees or other operations shall commence on site in connection with the development hereby approved, (including any tree felling, tree pruning, demolition works, soil moving, temporary access construction and or widening, or any operations involving the use of motorised vehicles or construction machinery) until a detailed Arboricultural Method Statement (As per section 7.2 BS5837-2005). has been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority, unless otherwise agreed in writing. No development or other operations shall take place except in complete accordance with the approved Method Statement. Such method statement shall include full detail of the following:

The feasibility of moving the 6 trees as per Plan C414D115 Rev "A" utilising an appropriate "Tree Spade" method.

Reason: In order to protect and safeguard the amenities of the area, in accordance with Policies LNE9 and LNE10 of the Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

3. No development shall take place in respect of the relocation of trees until a schedule of landscape maintenance for the above trees covering a minimum period of 5 years has been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority unless otherwise agreed in writing. The schedule shall include details of the arrangements for its implementation. Development shall be carried out in accordance with the approved schedule.

Reason: In order to improve the visual amenity of the areas, in accordance with Policies DA1, DA2, LNE9 and LNE10 of the Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

- The following additional conditions are recommended:-
  - 1. Before occupation details of the siting and specifications of the proposed bat and bird boxes shall be submitted to and agreed in writing by this Planning Authority. The development shall thereafter be implemented in accordance with the approved details and maintained as such.

Reason: In order to preserve and enhance the biological diversity of the woodland and surrounding area, in accordance with PPS9 and Policies LNE10 and LNE17 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

2. Prior to commencement of development on site details of the proposed temporary construction/demolition amphibian fence shall be submitted to and agreed in writing with the Local Planning Authority. This fence should be erected on site prior to works commencing on site and thereafter maintained for the duration of the works. Immediately prior to the erection of the fence the area should be fingertip searched by a licensed newt worker. In the unlikely event that newts are found then works should cease and a scheme to avoid harm to the newts should be submitted for approval.

Reason: To protect features of nature conservation, in accordance with PPS9 and Policy LNE19 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

3. Prior to the demolition of the buildings on site, a further inspection of the buildings shall take place with the details submitted for agreement by the Local Planning Authority, to determine presence or absence of roosting or hibernating bats. The works shall thereafter be implemented in accordance with the approved details and timing of the works unless otherwise agreed in writing with the Local Planning Authority.

Reason: To protect features of nature conservation, in accordance with PPS9 and Policy LNE19 of the Adopted Peterborough Local Plan (First Replacement).

It is of grave concern, the above proposal to build 34 dwellings at 80 Lincoln Road to house low income families. To bring vulnerable people here, who possibly have few prospects, to house them here in a known, very serious long established crime area, of ongoing Drugs and Prostitituition, which the Police have been unable to control, and which has been going on here since 1999.

80 Lincoln Road is in the middle of what is known locally as the Bermuda Triangle, which stretches from Burghley Road, down Lincoln Road, Park Road, crossed over by Church Walk and Manor House Street. Where Peterborough's Criminal Gangs control and operate strings of Drug Dealers and Prostitutes.

Residents of this area have been calling out in vanc since 1999, complaining to the Police, and to Peterborough City Council. Resulting in Police Operations Harrier, Nemesis, Abolish, when large numbers of Drug Dealers were arrested and taken off the streets, only to return again with this persistant menace.

Police operations against the Prostitutes have also not succeeded long term, as the crime gangs exploit this city centre hot spot of on going decline of the

property here, as long term residents have sold up their houses at a loss, to flee the area. The houses then transformed into multi occupied houses of single male immigrants, keeping up the demand for Prostituition! Also Drug Dealers and Prostitutes are known to solicit residents as they go out from their houses.

It cannot be right to be inviting vulnerable people on low incomes into this area, by building houses for them, to put them at risk of exploitation from the hard nosed crime organisations who control and operate this area. Further increasing the area to poverty and crime.
