PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Questions from members of the public

1. Question from Mark Simlo

Councillor Fitzgerald, Leader of the Council

Regarding the EG1 index plate assigned to the Mayor's car.

Please could I ask for an explanation as to what benefits to the taxpaying residents of Peterborough would be lost if it were to be sold in these tough economic times?

2. Question from Barry Turner

Councillor Cereste, Cabinet Member for Climate Change, Planning, Housing and Transport

Peterborough Council declared a climate emergency in 2019 and has committed to zero carbon by 2030.

There are opportunities for residents to contribute towards this, at little cost to the public purse, for example by installing double glazing, better insulation, installing heat pumps, switching to electric vehicles, installing solar panels.

The recent exponential rise in energy costs has transformed the economics of installing domestic solar photovoltaic power and rising inflation has further added to this. These installations can be up and running within a matter of months.

Will the Council urgently review its policies and remove obstacles it imposes on solar energy and enable more residents to generate their own electricity and also allow the supply of low-cost electricity to the grid for other users?

1. Question from Councillor Skibsted

Councillor Cereste, Cabinet Member for Climate Change, Planning, Housing and Transport

It has recently been published that the car park for the regional pool will now be used for a further university building and that currently there is no firm plan for where residents using the regional pool will be able to park.

While expansion of the university is very important for the city, the regional pool is a facility enjoyed by many - not least many children who learn to swim - and is one of the few places in Peterborough where people can swim for a reasonable price. Membership of the leisure centre is not way beyond many people's budget, as with private leisure facilities and clubs. Apparently, construction will start in February leaving very little time for alternative arrangements to be made for parking.

Can the Cabinet Member give assurance that a suitable parking alternative will be found for those using the regional pool to ensure that everyone has the access they need, be it families with children, elderly people, or disabled people, showing that welfare and health of Peterborough's citizens is of equal importance to university students. If this is not possible within one month, will the construction work be postponed to allow time to find a suitable alternative?

2. Question from Councillor Hemraj

Councillor Howard, Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care, Health and Public Health

With over capacity within our hospital and some patients who are medically fit for discharge putting pressure on our residents needing emergency care, do we know the pressures on social care currently in the city?

Councillor Steve Allen, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Communications, Culture and Communities

What progress is being made on the Council's strategy to tackle anti-social behaviour across the city?

4. Question from Councillor Stevenson (1)

Councillor Steve Allen, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Communications, Culture and Communities

Peterborough Police have issued a public call to parents after reports of anti-social behaviour involving teenagers at the new Puttstars facility in Queensgate. While Puttstars is private business, and Queensgate is a private business, is there anything the council can do resolve the situation, given the very negative impression these incidents leave with the public and potential visitors to the city?

Councillor Coles, Cabinet Member for Finance and Corporate Governance

Voters will be required to produce ID when voting in person at the local elections in May. What is the council doing to ensure the city's disabled people are fully aware of the changes and to ensure they do not become disenfranchised?

Councillor Cereste, Cabinet Member for Climate Change, Planning, Housing and Transport

The Council is going to rely on the Energy from Waste (EFW) plant as the main heat source for a heat network to supply local businesses (called the PIRI project). How are the businesses going to obtain heat when the EFW plant is not operating?

It is recommended that Council:

1. Agrees the allocation of seats on committees subject to political balance arrangements (**Updated Appendix 1**).

1. UPDATED KEY ISSUES

1.1 Following the publication of the agenda for the 25 January 2023 Council meeting, Councillor Ansar Ali announced his resignation from the Peterborough City Council Labour Group and his intention to sit as an independent Member. This brings the overall number of Peterborough City Council Members in political groups, and therefore to be included within proportionality calculations, from 59 to 58. The proposed calculation around political proportionality therefore needs to be updated accordingly.

2. UPDATED POLITICAL PROPORTIONALITY

2.1 The political balance of the Council can be calculated by using the following formula.

2.3 The calculation to determine the strict entitlement of political groups to seats on committees is:

As set out in the updated Appendix 1 and table 1, both the Peterborough First Group and the Green Group have the same entitlement to one additional committee seat. Consultation has been undertaken with both Group Leaders and informal agreement has been reached that the Peterborough First Group will take up the additional seat, as set out below.

3. CHANGES TO COMMITTEE SEATS

- In addition to those changes previously set out in the original Council report, the following changes to the committee seat allocation are set out in the Updated Appendix 1 as follows:
 - Labour Group to give up two seats, one on Corporate Parenting Committee, and one on Licensing Committee.
 - Conservative Group to gain one seat on Corporate Parenting Committee.
 - Peterborough First Group to gain one seat on Licensing Committee.
