1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To consider and determine this application for a new premises licence for Kim's Newsagents, 44 Eastfield Road, Peterborough, taking into account the representations received from the Responsible Authorities and 'other persons'.

2. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- 2.1 In August 2005 an application was granted by the Licensing Authority to convert an existing Justices Off Licence under Schedule 8 of the Licensing Act 2003 for 44 Eastfield Road to a premises licence. The applicant, Mr Churchill Singh Nassan, was granted a licence to sell alcohol 'off' the premises Monday to Saturday 8am to 11pm and Sunday 10am to 10.30pm.
- 2.2 The licence was transferred in September 2013 to Commercial First Business Limited who subsequently surrendered the licence in December 2013.
- 2.3 The nominated Designated Premises Supervisor for the premises, Mrs Roquia Alizada, has held a personal licence with Peterborough City Council since July 2009 and is currently the Designated Premises Supervisor for Victoria Food & Wine which is situated at 3 Winslow Road, Netherton, Peterborough.

3. AUTHORISATIONS AND TIMES APPLIED FOR

- **Sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises**
Monday to Sunday 09.00 to 02.00
- **Hours premises are open to the public**
Monday to Sunday 05.00 to 02.00

4. APPLICATION

4.1 Please refer to the application attached at **Appendix B**.

- 4.2 Representations have been received from Cambridgeshire Constabulary, Peterborough City Council's Planning Department, the local Public Health Authority, the local Member of Parliament, 2 local Councillors, the multi agency Eastern Neighbourhood Delivery Team and 21 'other persons'. There has also been a petition delivered against the granting of the premises licence signed by 49 persons. These representations are attached at **Appendix C**. There are no representations in support of the application.
- 4.4 Part P of the application sets out the applicant's proposed conditions under the licensing objectives, these being, 'The Prevention of Public Nuisance', 'Public Safety', 'Prevention of Crime and Disorder' and 'The Protection of Children from Harm'. These are also contained within the body of this report (in section 7) and in accordance with section 10.5 of Guidance have been interpreted into enforceable conditions. Only those appropriate and proportionate for the promotion of the licensing objectives have been included in the Operating Schedule.
- 4.5 No representations have been received from any of the other Responsible Authorities i.e. Peterborough City Council Trading Standards, Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service, Licensing Authority, Peterborough City Council Health & Safety Department, Children's Services or Peterborough City Council Environmental Pollution Team.
- 4.6 A 'Notice' was displayed in the newspaper in accordance with Part 4 No. 25 of Statutory Instruments 2005 No. 42 – The licensing Act 2003 (Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates) Regulations 2005.

5. OTHER PERSONS

5.1 Summary of issues raised

- If granted it would contribute to an increase in street drinking in the area.
- If granted it could lead to a rise in anti social behaviour
- If granted it would lead to an increase in noise and disturbance in the area.

6. MEDIATION

6.1 No mediation has taken place.

7. APPLICANT'S PROPOSED CONDITIONS UNDER THE LICENSING OBJECTIVES:

7.1 **Crime and disorder**

- Door supervisors shall be used to monitor customers and maintain customers and maintain public order. The monitoring process must include implementation of the premises' proof of age policy. All door supervisors must ensure that identification bearing the customers photograph, date of birth and integral holographic mark or security measure is produced before allowing entry and where it is not, entry shall be refused. Suitable means of identification would include PASS approved proof of age cards, photo-card driving licences and passports.
- The premises licence holder / designated premises supervisor, or in their absence another responsible person, to keep an 'Incident report register' in a bound book, in which full details of all incidents are recorded. This shall be completed as soon as possible and in any case no later than the close of business on the day of the incident. The time and date when the report was completed, and by whom, is to form part of the entry. The register is to be kept on the premises at all times and shall be produced to a Police Officer (incl PCSO) or an authorized Licensing Authority Officer when required. The records should be retained for a minimum of 12 months.
- The premises licence holder will ensure that a digital CCTV system is fully compliant with the guidance contained in the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) guidance document (www.informationcommissioner.gov.uk) regarding installation of CCTV is provided at the premises.

- The CCTV equipment shall be maintained in good working order and continually record when licensable activity takes place and for a period of a least 2 hours afterwards.
- A digital CCTV system shall cover all areas of the premises to which the public have access including any outside areas.
- Digital CCTV images shall be retained for a minimum of 28 days and should be produced to a Police Officer (including PCSOs) or Local Authority Officer immediately upon demand.
- The CCTV system shall be capable of downloading images to a recognizable viewable format.
- At all times the premises are open for business a member of staff shall be present who is capable of operating the digital CCTV system and downloading images at the request of a Police Officer (include PCSO) or Local Authority Officer.
- The CCTV system shall be capable of obtaining clear facial recognition images and a clear head and shoulders of every person entering or leaving the premises.
- If the CCTV equipment (including any mobile units in use at the premises) breaks down the premises licence holder or the designated premises supervisor shall ensure that they verbally inform both the Police & Licensing Authority as soon as is reasonably practicable. This information should be contemporaneously recorded in the incident report register and shall include the time, date and means this was done and to whom the information was reported. Equipment failures shall be repaired or replaced as soon as is reasonably practicable and without undue delay. The Police and Licensing Authority shall be informed when faults are rectified.
- The CCTV system covering any dedicated smoking area shall be fully operational and regularly monitored.
- The premises licence holder must provide contact details for any security personnel employed at the premises to an authorised officer of the Local Authority or a Police Officer (inc PCSO) upon request.
- Notices advising that CCTV has been installed on the premises shall be posted up so that they are clearly visible to the public within the licensed premises.
- An authorised person will be available at all times on the premises to show CCTV images immediately or to an authorised officer on demand. CCTV images will be clear and comprehensible.
- No customers carrying open or sealed bottles, cans or other receptacles containing alcoholic liquor shall be admitted to the premises at any time that the premises are open to the public.
- The premises licence holder and/or designated premises supervisor shall ensure that any outside area included in the licence will be controlled in a safe and effective manner to the same standard operated within the premises building and will pay special attention to the impact that the use of the outside area has on the surrounding community.
- An alcohol refusals register will be kept at the premises and kept and maintained by all staff. The register will contain the date and time of the potential sale, what product was refused and a brief description of the person and the name and signature of the person who refused the sale.
- Written staff training records will be documented and updated on a monthly basis. These training records will be produced to an authorised officer on demand.
- The premises licence holder or nominated person shall provide a written drugs policy detailing the actions to be undertaken to minimize the opportunity to use or supply illegal substances within the premises.
- The premises licence holder or nominated person shall ensure that records are maintained detailing the time and date of substance misuse training, the people who received the training and the name of the person delivering the training. The records will be available for inspection by an authorised officer at all reasonable times. The records will be retained for at least 12 months.
- The premises licence holder or nominated person shall deliver a structured programme at regular intervals to all staff that deal with persons who are in possession of / or incapacitated through the use of drugs or the combined effect of drugs and alcohol. The premises licence holder or nominated person shall ensure that where a drug safe is available on the premises to deposit finds there will be a clear policy for the handling and packaging of seized items. **NB:** For premises with a suitable 'drug safe' the items secured within that safe are **not** considered as being in their possession.

- The premises licence holder or nominated person shall ensure that a clearly visible notice is displayed advising those attending the premises that the Police will be informed if anyone is found in possession of controlled substances or weapons.
- Notices relating to any restrictions on the admittance of individuals according to age (e.g. *Children*) shall be displayed on or immediately outside the premises.
- Any conditions of entry to the premises shall be displayed in the vicinity of any entrance to the premises.
- Any grills and / or alarms installed at the licensed premises shall be maintained in working order and regularly serviced by a suitably qualified person.
- No person under 18 years of age shall be permitted within the premises at any time and a notice shall be clearly displayed at the entrance to the premises stating 'No persons under 18 will be admitted' in a prominent position so that it can be easily read by persons entering the premises.
- The premises licence holder shall be responsible for prevention and disposal of waste on the frontage of the premises and make provision for the emptying of litter bins in the vicinity of the premises.
- The premise license holder shall not participate or encourage flyposting of events or the venue and any leaflet distribution shall be managed in such a way as to prevent litter.
- Lighting shall be provided outside the premises (and in the private car park) during the hours of darkness when any licensable activity takes place on the premises

7.2 **Prevention of Public Nuisance**

- No conditions proposed by applicant.

7.3 **Protection of children from harm**

- Any person selling or supplying alcoholic drink under the authority of a personal licence holder must ask for a photo ID proof of age where they have reason to suspect that the individual may be under 21 years of age.

9. **LICENSING OFFICER'S COMMENT (FOR INFORMATION)**

9.1 Regulation 19(a) requires authorities to disregard any information given by a party or person that is "not relevant" to the application.

9.2 Members should note that the letters attached are in their entirety and that not all matters raised within the representations are relevant matters for consideration under the Licensing Act 2003. It is up to the Committee to decide upon what 'weight' they attach to these areas.

10. LEGAL OFFICER'S COMMENTS

10.1 The Licensing Authority (hereafter referred to as "the Council) is charged with implementing the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. This is an application for a new licence made under Section 17 of the Licensing Act.

10.2 In this case, the application was received at these offices on 17 September 2014.

10.3 The application before this committee will be treated on its own merits, and the Licensing committee will make its decision based upon

- The merits of the application
- The promotion of the four licensing objectives
- The statement of policy of the Licensing Authority
- The Guidance issued by the Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 – October 2012

10.4 The licensing authority may determine the application, depending upon what is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, in any of the following ways:

- Decide to grant the licence in the same terms as it was applied for
- Decide to grant the licence, but to modify or add conditions (to promote the licensing objectives)
- Exclude from the scope of the licence a licensable activity
- Decide to refuse to grant the licence

10.5 Conditions are modified if they are altered, omitted or any new condition added (Section 35(4) Licensing Act 2003).

LICENSING ACT 2003 GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Note: In this document, the following definitions are included to provide an explanation of certain terms included in the Act. In some cases they are an abbreviation of what is stated in the Licensing Act 2003 or an interpretation of those terms. For a full definition of the terms used, the reader must refer to the Licensing Act 2003.

‘Child’

- (a) means an individual aged under 16
- (b) a child is unaccompanied if he is not in the company of an individual aged 18 years or over

DCMS: Department for Culture Media and Sport

‘Designated Premises Supervisor’ means the person (who must be a Personal Licence Holder), in the case of premises selling alcohol, who will normally have been given the day to day responsibility for running the premises by the holder of the Premises Licence or will be the Premises Licence holder.

‘Other Persons’:

- persons who live, or are involved in a business, in the relevant licensing Authorities area and who are likely to be affected by the application and are not a Responsible Authority.

‘Late Night Refreshment’ means the supply of hot food or hot drink to members of the public (whether for consumption on or off the premises) between the hours of 11.00 pm and 5.00 am.

‘Licensable Activities’ means: -

- The sale by retail of alcohol
- The supply of alcohol by or on behalf of a club to, or to the order of, a member of the club
- The provision of Regulated Entertainment
- The provision of Late Night Refreshment

‘Licensing Authority’: - is the licensing function of Peterborough City Council

‘Licensed Premises’ includes club premises and events unless the context otherwise requires.

‘Licensing Objectives’

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm

‘Operating Schedule’ means a document containing a statement of the following matters (and any others that may be prescribed): -

- The relevant Licensable Activities
- The times at which the Licensable Activities are to take place and any other times when premises are open to the public
- Information regarding the person who will be specified in the Premises Licence as the Premises Supervisor
- Where the Licensable Activities involve the supply of alcohol, whether it is for the supply on and/or off the premises
- The steps being taken to promote the Licensing Objectives

‘Rateable Value’: as regards a premises, is the value for the time being in force for the premises entered in the local non-domestic rating list for the purposes of Part III of the Local Government Finance Act 1988(b).

‘Regulated Entertainment’ (Schedule 1 of the Act) means: -

- A performance of a play
- An exhibition of a film
- An indoor sporting event
- A boxing or wrestling entertainment
- A performance of live music
- Any playing of recorded music
- A performance of dance

Or entertainment of a similar description falling within the last three of the categories listed above, where the entertainment takes place in the presence of and for the purposes of entertaining that audience or spectators.

Or the provision of entertainment facilities:

Facilities for enabling persons to take part in entertainment of the following description for the purpose or purposes, which include the purpose of being entertained:

- making music
- dancing
- entertainment of a similar description

‘Relevant Licensing Authority’: is the Authority in the area the premises are situated.

‘Responsible Authority’ means any of the following: -

- Cambridgeshire Constabulary (The Chief Officer of Police)
- Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue (The Fire Authority)
- Health and Safety Team, Peterborough City Council
- Planning authority, Peterborough City Council
- Trading Standards, Peterborough City Council
- Environmental Health – Pollution, Peterborough City Council
- Children’s Services – Child Protection & Review Manager
- Primary Care Trust or Local Health Board (Director of Public Health)
- The Relevant Licensing Authority, Peterborough City Council
- Maritime & Coastguard Agency, Walton on Naze. (For vessels carrying more than 12 passengers.)
- Environment Agency, Peterborough (For vessels carrying 12 or less passengers).

‘Supply of alcohol’:

- the sale by retail of alcohol, or
- the supply of alcohol by or on behalf of a club to, or to the order of, a member of the club.

‘Temporary Event Notice’ means a Permitted Temporary Activity involving one or more Licensable Activities subject to the following various conditions and limitations: -

- Duration – they are limited to events lasting for up to 168 hours (7 days);
- Scale – they cannot involve the presence of more than 499 people at any one time;
- Use of the same premises – the same premises cannot be used on more than 12 occasions in a calendar year, but are subject to the overall aggregate of 21 days irrespective of the number of occasions on which they have been used; and

- The number of notices given by an individual within a given period of time – a Personal Licence Holder is limited to 50 notices in one year and another person to 5 notices in a similar period.

(In any other circumstances, a full Premises Licence or Club Premises Certificate will be required for the period of the event).

‘the Act’: means the Licensing Act 2003

CONDITIONS RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY

Any individual preparing an operating schedule is at liberty to volunteer any measure as a step he or she intends to take to promote the licensing objectives. When incorporated into the licence or certificate as a condition, these measures will be enforceable under the law and a breach of condition could give rise to prosecution.

In some premises existing legislation (*for example, the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005 (as amended)*) may provide adequately for the safety of the public or club members and guests. If this is the case, it is **NOT NECESSARY** to volunteer the same measures to promote the public safety objective. The pool of conditions provided below is intended to assist applicants if they consider that additional steps are necessary.

Whether or not any risk assessment shows any of the measures to be necessary in the individual circumstances of any premises will depend on a range of factors. These include the nature and style of the venue, the activities being conducted there, the location of the premises and the anticipated clientele of the business. Necessary conditions for the licence or certificate will also depend on local knowledge of the premises.

On Tuesday 23rd September 2014 Cambridgeshire Constabulary Licensing Department (Peterborough District) received e-mail notification from Peterborough City Council Licensing Authority of an application for a new Premises License at 44 Eastfield Road, PE1 4AN. A duplicate postal copy has been received by this department. The application has been submitted by Mr. ABDUL LATIF HUSSANI of Glinton Street, Peterborough, PE1 5HH. The proposed Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) is Mr. ROQUIA ALIZADA of Glinton Street, Peterborough, PE1 5HJ. Mr. ALIZADA holds an Alcohol Personal License issued by PCC Licensing Authority reference: 056778.

This application seeks to install a new premises license at 44 Eastfield Road with the premises open and the supply of alcohol 'Off Premises' between 09:00am and 02:00pm daily (17 hours). No other licensable activity has been applied for.

44 Eastfield Road is located within a terraced row of commercial and residential buildings at the south end of Eastfield Road (See Annex A for visual reference). It was previously known as 'KIM'S SUPERMARKET', which has been closed by the owner for a considerable period of time and the previous Premises License has since lapsed. There are currently 10 licensed premises within 150 meters of 44 Eastfield Road and excessive evidence already exists of a negative cumulative impact on the statutory objectives caused by alcohol harm within the immediate area.

The applicant has asked for the standard conditions to be added to the license which include CCTV, refusal register, and proof of age scheme – conditions routinely applied for given normal circumstances. In my professional opinion as the Cambridgeshire Constabulary Licensing Officer for Peterborough District this application will more than likely add to the existing cumulative impact. Alcohol is having a significant impact on the local community specifically to the community around the proposed shop location. There already exist a high number of licensed premises - making this area the focal saturation point within the community.

The Community is hindered and harassed by alcohol and drug harm and Cambridgeshire Police, along with partners are pouring additional resources into the area to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour (ASB), that which is ruining the quality of life in the area. There exists a high number of rented properties with a large number consisting of multi occupancy residential leases with a diverse ethnic bearing.

Crime and ASB has continued to increase and at the point of compiling this report I am aware that since 01st January 2014 - within the PE1 4AN postcode area - there have been **381** recorded Incidents reported to the Police. These reports involve Robbery, Domestic

Violence, Violence, ASB, Street Drinking, Criminal Damage, Noise, Burglary and Drugs to name but a few. Whilst I have not drilled down into each individual incident, a significant number do involve alcohol that is either directly or indirectly connected with the local licensed premises. **68** crimes were recorded that relate to over 68 victims of crime within this small geographical area. I am confident there will be evidence within these crimes of the cumulative impact existing licensed premises and alcohol already has a harmful grip on the local community.

I have taken the liberty to compare this postcode area with another which is less than 150 meters away. On checking similar statistics for postcode area PE1 4AS – the postcode for the licensed premises on the junction of Eastfield Road and Padholme Road - the figures found are remarkably less. I noted that the Police data systems show only **9** crimes and **32** incidents. Although this licensed premises falls within the area detailed above it clearly shows there is a significant harm problem at the other postcode area – and only 150 meters away. Late opening premises with the offer of cheap and available alcohol is attracting victims and predators alike resulting in increased crime and anti-social behaviour.

Hard work and effort has been put into this area by the local Policing team working in partnership with local authority agencies. Regular and consistent patrols have been successful in deterring crime and ASB. The Licensing Authority has made several visits to existing licensed premises to remind them of the licensing objectives and deal with minor breaches to Premises License. The granting of another license within this controversial area would be detrimental to this hard work and set back positive moves that have been made in improving the quality of life for the local community and its residents.

The Safer Peterborough partnership are currently consulting on a positive consideration to expanding the current Cumulative Impact Policy (CIP) in place within the Operation CAN-DO area across the district to incorporate the wider area around lower Eastfield Road. The CIP within CAN-DO has been remarkably successful in rejuvenating and regenerating the Millfield / New England giving back a better quality of life in the area and as such Eastfield Road can only benefit from such an expansion to the Policy. An Eastern Area Neighbourhood Delivery Team (Eastern NDT) has commissioned an 'Area Report' which gives statistical and analytical data on the problems faced within the Eastern Sector which includes Eastfield Road. The report highlights the lower part of Eastfield Road as being the hotspot for crime and ASB.

Cambridgeshire Constabulary do not support this application and appeal to the Licensing sub-committee to seriously consider the information before them and reject the application. Whilst I bear no prejudice towards the applicant or the DPS this area will not benefit from the addition of another licensed premises. The only people to benefit will be those selling alcohol for the sole sake of profit. It is widely known that a small general store could generate over 60% of profit from sales alone, and I have been advised by other licensees that they would not survive as a business without the ability to sell alcohol. This can lead to complications concerning the licensing objectives where due diligence is relaxed for the sake of profit.

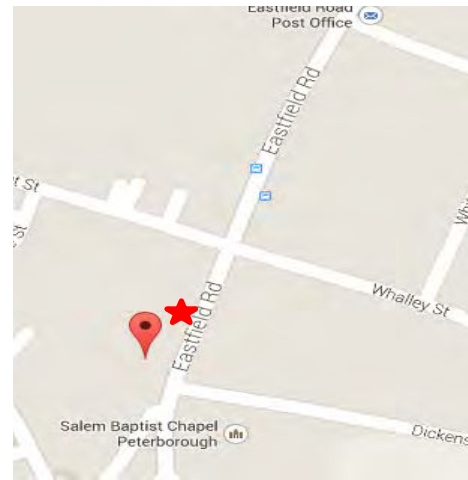


This illustration highlights the postcode areas connected with this report.

Thank you for sending us a copy of this license application. We have particular concerns for this locality in terms of problems relating to alcohol. We understand from the specialist service the council commissions that there is a high level of street drinking in this area, and that much of the alcohol consumed by street drinkers in the neighbouring areas of the cemetery and the Stanley recreation ground is purchased from the many existing licensed premises of Eastfield Road. We understand from police colleagues that there is a considerable amount of crime and anti-social behaviour in the area, and that this is not dissimilar to the past profile of the Operation CAN-Do area in Millfield.

We are aware that the local Neighbourhood Delivery Team (NDT), reflecting the priorities of the Neighbourhood Panel, has expressed a desire to propose extensions to the alcohol Cumulative Impact Policy (CIP) currently in place and demonstrably effective in the Operation CAN-Do area, to include the southern end of Eastfield Road. We supported the development the CIP in the Operation CAN-Do area which we believe makes an important contribution to health and wellbeing, community cohesion and crime and disorder reduction in the neighbourhood. We will be pleased to support plans to extend the CIP to Eastfield Road.

We believe it is important that we strive to reduce alcohol-related harm among all people living in our city. We had hoped that "health" would become an objective under the Licensing Act as envisaged by the government's National Alcohol Strategy launched in 2012, and so we welcome the Licensing Act 2003 [Amendment] Bill introduced to the House of Lords this year by Lord Brooke of Alverthorpe which seeks to introduce an additional licensing objective, "protecting and improving public health".

While the current licensing system does not allow for objection purely on the grounds of health, we oppose this application on the grounds of the indisputable link between alcohol and crime and disorder.

The National Alcohol Strategy (2012) estimates that annually in a community with Peterborough's population:

- 1,800 people will be a victim of alcohol-related violent crime;
- Over 700 11-15 year olds will be drinking weekly;
- Over 23,000 people will binge-drink.

Nationally we know that:


- 47% of violent offenders are believed to be under the influence of alcohol, rising to 62% in incidents of 'stranger' violence;
- 32% of young people surveyed reported being under the influence of alcohol when committing criminal damage offences (NICE, 2010);
- 30% of all sexual assaults are estimated to have taken place when the offender has been under the influence of alcohol; and
- Studies in America have shown alcohol is behind up to 73% of domestic abuse incidents. Research in the UK is showing that where alcohol is involved the severity of the assault is worse (Alcohol Concern, 2010).

In our region Peterborough has the highest rate of alcohol offences per thousand population, at 9.62. The cost of crime and antisocial behaviour linked to alcohol in England is estimated to be £8 billion (NICE, 2010). Analysis of these costs for Peterborough leads us to believe the annual cost of alcohol-related crime and antisocial behaviour to be in the region of £10m. We consider licensing legislation to be an important contributor to reducing harm by restricting availability and safeguarding the public, including the young and vulnerable.

In its publication *"Alcohol-use disorders: preventing harmful drinking. Evidence update 54"* (March 2014), the National Institute for Clinical and Health Excellence (NICE) concludes: "A higher density of off-premises alcohol outlets may be associated with increases in mortality, rates of admission to hospital because of assault or alcohol-related disease, and domestic violence. Higher density of other types of licensed premises may also be associated with increases in admission to hospital because of assault or alcohol-related disease."

We therefore oppose this license application.

If the committee believe there is justification for granting another licence, then consideration should be given to reducing the length of time each day that alcohol may be sold from 2am to something far more socially acceptable, say 11.30pm.

Given the levels of crime in the area, the question needs to be asked about the nature of people who need to be purchasing alcohol in the early hours of the morning.

Residents typically comment on the way in which the Lower Eastfield Road area is fast becoming as replica of the Lincoln Road area of Millfield. The Licensing Committee now have an opportunity to halt this downwards drift.

During this time there must be at least one public notice in a local paper and a blue A4 public notice displayed on site for 28 consecutive days. The application will also appear on the public register.

Any representations must relate to one of the four licensing objectives below:

This relates to any crime, disorder or anti-social behavior in connection with the management of the premises. The licence holder cannot be responsible for the conduct of individuals once they leave the premises.

Public safety

This relates to the safety of the public on the premises - such as fire safety, lighting and first aid.

This can relate to hours of operation, noise and vibration, noxious smells, light pollution and litter.

The protection of children from harm

This relates to protecting children from the activities carried out on the premises whilst they are on the premises. The law already provides special protections for children, such as making it illegal for children under 18 to buy alcohol.

I would also suggest, that an urgent review needs to take place regarding the existing licensed premises on Eastfield road, with a view to revoking or restricting the hours of licensing until 10pm.

I have personally witnessed many of the shops selling alcohol to underage children and selling alcohol beyond their official hours of trading.

Particularly prolific offenders are the shop on the corner of Eastfield Road and Padholme Road and the shop on the corner of Monument street.

Enough is enough. The residence of Eastfield road should not have to live, and be punished by, the ill consequences of thoughtless planning decisions. The council has a responsibility to reverse this wheel of misfortune as a matter of urgency.

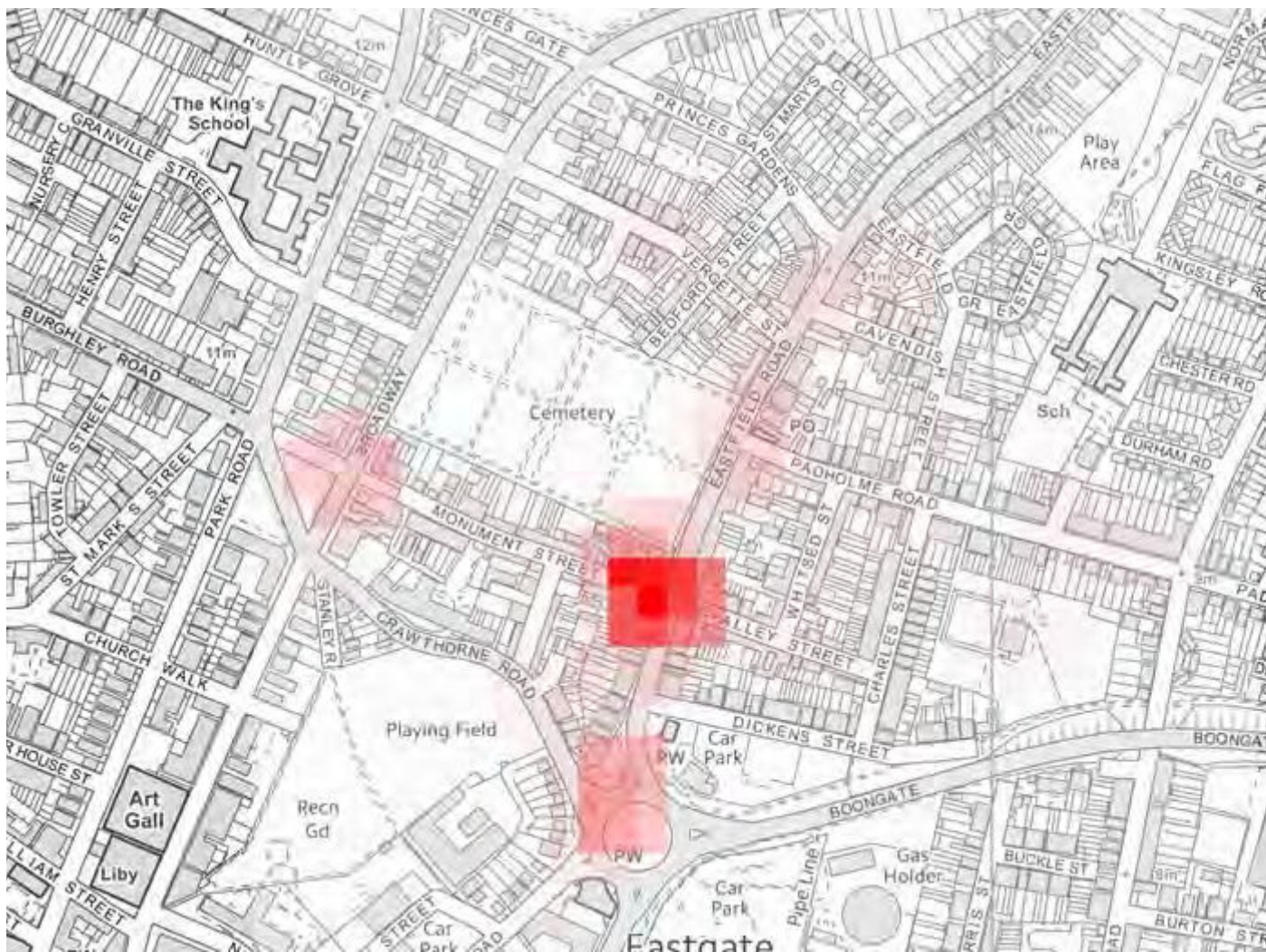

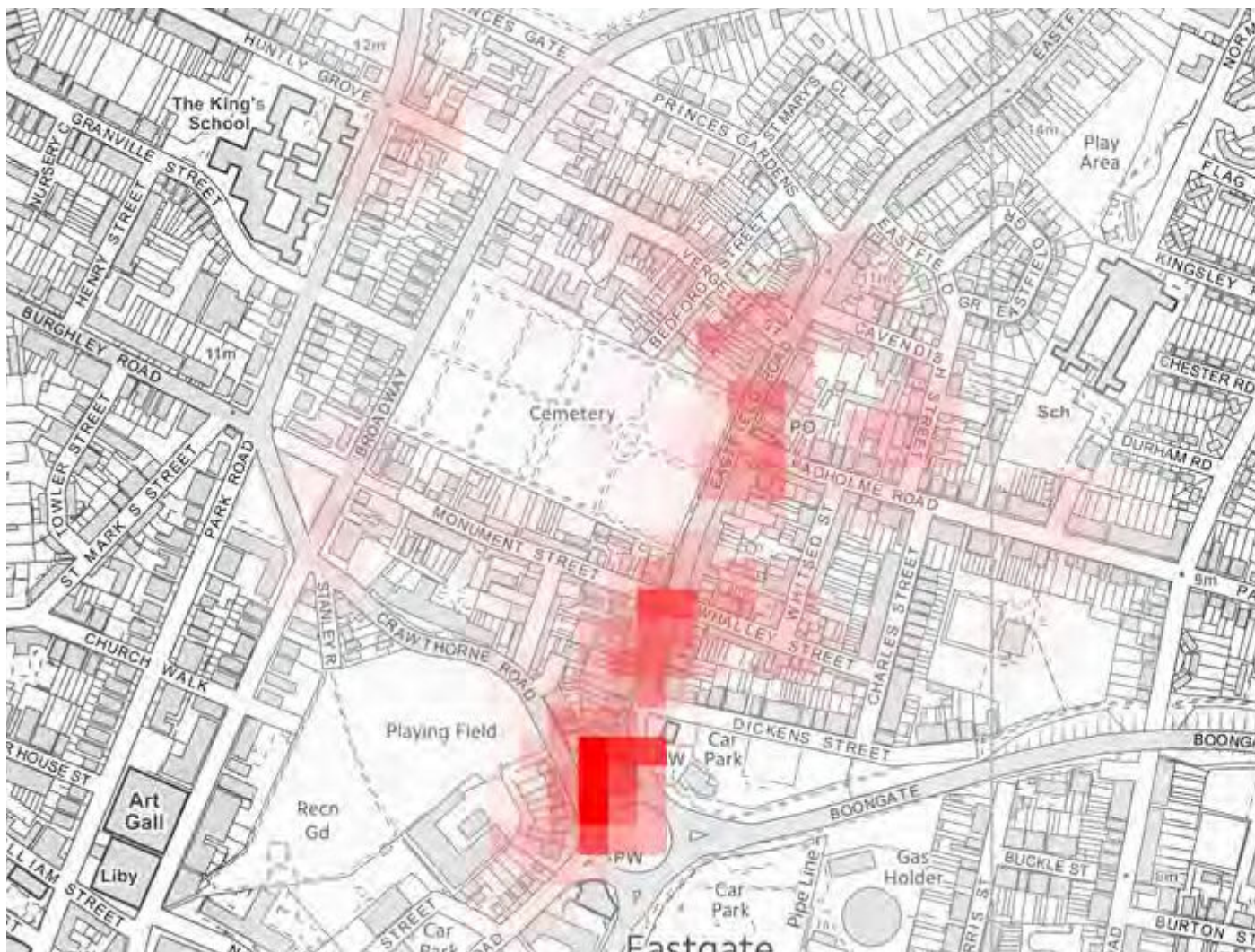
1. ASB Heat map

<p>Prevention of crime and disorder</p> <p>There are a large number of premises in the vicinity which already have licences to sell alcohol. In recent times I have witnessed incidents of aggression and antisocial behaviour in this area on a regular basis. It has been clear that in many of these incidents, the participants have been intoxicated. These incidents often occur immediately outside licensed premises. Groups of drinkers can often be seen loitering on the street, going back into the premises to restock their supplies of alcohol and then continuing to drink. I would expect that if the owner of the licenced premises refused to sell alcohol to an already intoxicated person, as the law requires, this could lead to potential crime and disorder within the premises itself, as well outside. Issuing yet another licence will only increase the availability of alcohol and subsequently the level of drinking and antisocial behaviour. The level of crime reported to the police demonstrate the level of difficulty the area already faces.</p> <p>Police reported incidents May - August 2014</p> <p>67 reported crimes of anti-social behaviour in the area 8 drug related offences</p>

22 violent crimes

The level of alcohol use, facilitated by the issuing of multiple alcohol licences, reduces the overall safety of the area. Antisocial behaviour is targeted at members of the public who happen to be using the street. The area is busy with a wide range of people using the road both as a shopping area and a thoroughfare. I have experienced abusive behaviour from others, which has often been exacerbated by their use of alcohol. Previously I would have felt safe walking in the area both day and night. Unfortunately, now this is not the case. This road is also used by children attending school and I am aware of them having to deal with similar experiences; where they feel threatened and unsafe. As a health professional who deals with the mental health of young people, I would also be concerned that this would be yet another premises in which underage people are able to buy alcohol.

Adding yet another outlet which sells alcohol will, in my opinion, only increase the difficulties in the area which are frequently alcohol related. The area already has a high level of licensed premises and this is having a detrimental impact both on residents and the wider immunity. I fear a further increase in noise late at night, increased littering and increased public urination, all of which I have had the dubious pleasure of witnessing in the area around other license premises. I have also had bottles and litter thrown at my house and into my garden on numerous occasions. There are an ample number of shops selling alcohol in the area and we do not need another. I hope that the wider health, safety and welfare of the area will be considered before a decision to issue this licence is made.


These problems have already been recorded by the Police.

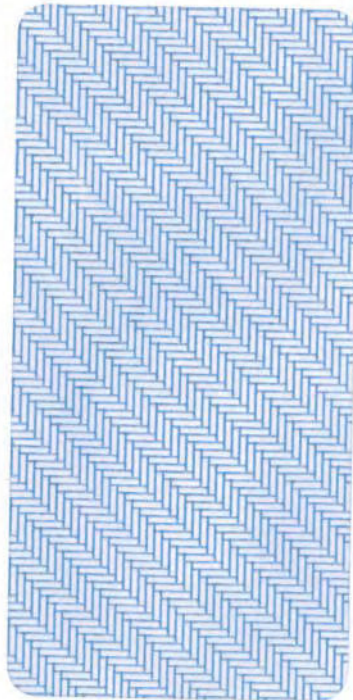

We have listed below our grievances and reasons of the objection to grant an alcohol Sales licence to the above applicant by all residents who have signed this petition and objection. We have been numerous times in touch with the Police, Peterborough Council and spoken over time with a range of officers and departments about the unbearable and unacceptable situation in Monument Street, Eastfield Road, Monument Court, Gloucester Place and other immediate affected Streets around here. The Licencing department and Police will have a well-documented lists of past and present incidents of requests of attendance and action in our area.

It should be noted that despite the great deal of signatures collected, many people are literally scared to give names or signatures, believing that they could be targeted and the total number of signatories could easily be double the number.





