1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 To consider and determine this application for a new premises licence for International Shop, 32-34 Dogsthorpe Road, Peterborough, PE1 3AF taking into account the background information and representations received from a Local Councillor, the Chair of MANERP (Millfield and New England Regeneration Partnership) and two ‘other persons’ in opposition of the application.

2. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

2.1 There has not been any previous application under the Licensing Act 2003 for this premises.

2.2 Since 18th April 2013 the Licensing Authority has adopted a special policy relating to the cumulative impact in respect to all licensed premises within the ‘Operation Can – Do’ area. An explanation of what this special policy entails can be found on page 10 of the Council’s Statement of Licensing Policy. A map showing the Can – Do area is attached at **Appendix B Page 11**.

2.3 The premises falls within the ‘Operation Can – Do’ area and is therefore subject to the provisions of the special ‘cumulative impact’ policy.

3. AUTHORISATIONS AND TIMES APPLIED FOR

- **Sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises only**

Monday to Sunday 8am to 11pm

- **Opening hours of premises**

Monday to Sunday 8am to 11pm

4. APPLICATION

- 4.1 Please refer to the application attached at **Appendix C – Pages 13**
- 4.2 Representations against the application have been received from 1 Councillor, the Chair of Manerp & two 'other persons'. These are attached at **Appendix D on Page 35**.
- 4.3 Part P of the application sets out the applicant's proposed conditions under the licensing objectives, these being, 'The Prevention of Public Nuisance', 'Public Safety', 'Prevention of Crime and Disorder' and 'The Protection of Children from Harm'. These are also contained within the body of this report (in section 7) and in accordance with section 10.5 of Guidance have been interpreted into enforceable conditions. Only those appropriate and proportionate for the promotion of the licensing objectives have been included in the Operating Schedule.
- 4.4 No representations have been received from the following Responsible Authorities. Peterborough Trading Standards, Public Health Authority, Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service, Licensing Authority, Peterborough City Council Planning Department, Peterborough City Council Health & Safety Department, Peterborough City Council Environmental Pollution Team, or Children's Services.
- 4.5 A 'Notice' was displayed in the newspaper in accordance with Part 4 No. 25 of Statutory Instruments 2005 No. 42 – The licensing Act 2003 (Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates) Regulations 2005, **Appendix E on page 47**.

5. REPRESENTATIONS

- 5.1 Summary of issues raised by Councillor Ferris, Manerp & 'other persons' objecting to the application:
- In 'Op Can-do' area which is now subject to a special 'cumulative impact policy.
 - Another premises offering 'Off Sales' of alcohol would lead to an increase in anti-social behaviour in the vicinity.
- 5.2 There were no representations in support of the application.

6. MEDIATION

- 6.1 Mediation has not taken place. Cambridgeshire Constabulary have requested additional conditions and a reduction in opening hours to 21:00 hrs, **Appendix F on page 50**. This has not been mediated with the applicants agent due to the number of additional representations.

7. APPLICANT'S PROPOSED CONDITIONS UNDER THE LICENSING OBJECTIVES :

7.1 Crime and disorder

These conditions have been carefully formulated to support the Licensing Objectives, taking into account the premises is located within the Cumulative Impact Area (CIA).

- Alcohol available for sale will be restricted between the hours of 08.00 until 23.00.
- The Licensee will display at all times in close proximity to all alcohol displays within the premises, the current Alcohol guidelines produced by the Chief Medical Officers. (see attached – simple A4 poster).
- There will be no window display posters or similar advertising containing and reference to alcohol on the premises shop frontage or the highway abutting the premises.
- Spirits must be displayed and secured behind the sales point and will not be available for self-service.
- There will be no sales of beer, lager, or cider over 6% ABV.

- The licence holder shall operate and maintain a refusals register in respect of declined sales of alcohol where the attempted purchase was suspected of being under 18 years of age or drunk.
- The refusals register shall be kept on the premises and be made available immediately upon request to an authorised officer of the Police or Local Authority.
- The licence holder will ensure that within six weeks of any appointment of a member of staff, they receive adequate training in responsible alcohol retailing and refreshed every 12 months. A training record will be kept at the premises.
- No alcoholic drinks will be purchased by the store owners or staff from sellers calling at the store.
- All invoices (originals or copies) for all alcoholic goods for retail sale on the premises will be kept at the shop and made available to Police, Council and HMRC Officers upon request. An ultra-violet light will be available at the premises for the purpose of checking the UK Duty Stamp on all spirits as soon as practical after they have been purchased.
- If any spirits bought by the company have UK Duty Stamps that do not fluoresce under ultra-violet light, or are otherwise suspicious, the licensee shall identify the supplier to Trading Standards department and HMRC as soon as possible.
- A fully working and maintained CCTV system capable of recording and storing images must be installed on the premises. The system must record at all times the premises is open to the public and images must be stored for a minimum of 28 days with date & time stamping. As a minimum this must cover all entry and exit points, both sides of all areas where the sale/supply of alcohol takes place.
- All recordings must be made available to an officer from a responsible authority upon reasonable request and in line with the provisions of the Data Protection Act 1998.
- All staff involved in the retail of alcohol will be trained in relation to the law regarding its sale. This training must be completed prior to them being authorised to sell alcohol and refreshed every 12 months as a minimum. A record of this training must be kept and maintained with a copy of the syllabus attached. The recipient of the training must sign to state that they have received and understood the training and this should be dated. Training records must be kept on the premises at all times and made available to an officer from a responsible authority upon reasonable request.
- The premises will operate and adhere to an age verification scheme with the minimum standard of Challenge 25. Signs advertising the policy must be displayed in all areas where alcohol is for sale.
- A refusals register will be kept on the premises for the recording of any incidents involving the refusal of a sale of alcohol due to age or drunkenness. The register will be made available to an officer from the local authority for inspection upon reasonable request.
- No person will be allowed to enter or leave the licensed premises with an open vessel of alcohol and the licensee will actively discourage and prevent anyone congregating or drinking outside the premises.

7.2 **Prevention of Public Nuisance**

- Persons shall be discouraged from congregating outside of the premises.
- A notice will be placed immediately outside the main entrance reminding persons that no alcohol to be consumed directly outside the main entrance to the shop.
- Waste collection contractors will not collect refuse between 23:00 and 07:00 hours.

- Any litter or refuse generated must be contained within the boundaries of the premises and regularly cleared (the boundaries of the premises are taken to be those indicated on the plan.
- Receptacles for waste shall be emptied regularly to avoid causing a public nuisance through smells or odours and shall be maintained in a clean condition.
- Trade waste containers will only be left out for collection of waste on the day of collection and will be stored off the public right of way at all other times.
- Clear and legible notices will be prominently displayed at all exits asking customers to respect local residents and to leave the area quietly.

7.3 **Protection of children from harm**

- The challenge 25 scheme will be implemented.
- To ensure that any person selling or supplying alcoholic drink under the authority of a personal licence holder follows the guidelines of the Challenge 25 scheme and asks for photo ID proof of age where they have reason to suspect that the individual may be under 25 years of age and to ensure that signs relevant to this condition are prominently displayed at the premises.

- The premises will conform to all statutory Health and Safety Requirements.

9. **LICENSING OFFICER'S COMMENT (FOR INFORMATION)**

- 9.1 Regulation 19(a) requires authorities to disregard any information given by a party or person that is "not relevant" to the application.
- 9.2 Members should note that the letters and emails attached are in their entirety and that not all matters raised within the representations are relevant matters for consideration under the Licensing Act 2003. It is up to the Committee to decide upon what 'weight' they attach to these areas.

10. **LEGAL OFFICER'S COMMENTS**

10.1 The Licensing Authority (hereafter referred to as "the Council) is charged with implementing the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. This is an application for a new licence made under Section 17 of the Licensing Act.

10.2 In this case, the application was received at these offices on 17 September 2018.

- 10.3 The application before this Committee will be treated on its own merits, and the Licensing committee will make its decision based upon:
- The merits of the application;
 - The promotion of the four licensing objectives;
 - The statement of policy of the Licensing Authority; and
 - The Guidance issued by the Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 – April 2018.
- 10.4 The licensing authority may determine the application, depending upon what is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, in any of the following ways:
- Decide to grant the licence in the same terms as it was applied for;
 - Decide to grant the licence, but to modify or add conditions (to promote the licensing objectives);
 - Exclude from the scope of the licence a licensable activity; and
 - Decide to refuse to grant the licence.
- 10.5 Conditions are modified if they are altered, omitted or any new condition added (Section 35(4) Licensing Act 2003).

APPENDIX A

LICENSING ACT 2003

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Note: In this document, the following definitions are included to provide an explanation of certain terms included in the Act. In some cases they are an abbreviation of what is stated in the Licensing Act 2003 or an interpretation of those terms. For a full definition of the terms used, the reader must refer to the Licensing Act 2003.

'Child'

(a) means an individual aged under 16

(b) a child is unaccompanied if he is not in the company of an individual aged 18 years or over

DCMS: Department for Culture Media and Sport

'Designated Premises Supervisor' means the person (who must be a Personal Licence Holder), in the case of premises selling alcohol, who will normally have been given the day to day responsibility for running the premises by the holder of the Premises Licence or will be the Premises Licence holder.

'Other Persons':

- persons who live, or are involved in a business, in the relevant licensing Authorities area and who are likely to be affected by the application and are not a Responsible Authority.

'Late Night Refreshment' means the supply of hot food or hot drink to members of the public (whether for consumption on or off the premises) between the hours of 11.00 pm and 5.00 am.

'Licensable Activities' means: -

- The sale by retail of alcohol
- The supply of alcohol by or on behalf of a club to, or to the order of, a member of the club
- The provision of Regulated Entertainment
- The provision of Late Night Refreshment

'Licensing Authority': - is the licensing function of Peterborough City Council

'Licensed Premises' includes club premises and events unless the context otherwise requires.

'Licensing Objectives'

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm

'Operating Schedule' means a document containing a statement of the following matters (and any others that may be prescribed): -

- The relevant Licensable Activities
- The times at which the Licensable Activities are to take place and any other times when premises are open to the public
- Information regarding the person who will be specified in the Premises Licence as the Premises Supervisor
- Where the Licensable Activities involve the supply of alcohol, whether it is for the supply on and/or off the premises
- The steps being taken to promote the Licensing Objectives

'Challenge 25' means that a retailer will ask for proof of identification if they have reason to believe that the person making a purchase of alcohol is under the age of 25.

'Rateable Value': as regards a premises, is the value for the time being in force for the premises entered in the local non-domestic rating list for the purposes of Part III of the Local Government Finance Act 1988(b).

'Regulated Entertainment' (Schedule 1 of the Act) means: -

- A performance of a play
- An exhibition of a film
- An indoor sporting event
- A boxing or wrestling entertainment
- A performance of live music
- Any playing of recorded music
- A performance of dance

Except where there is an exemption under the Live Music Act 2012 or Statutory Instrument 2013 No. 1578 The Licensing Act 2003 (Descriptions of Entertainment) (Amendment) Order 2013

Or entertainment of a similar description falling within the last three of the categories listed above, where the entertainment takes place in the presence of and for the purposes of entertaining that audience or spectators.

'Relevant Licensing Authority': is the Authority in the area the premises are situated.

'Responsible Authority' means any of the following: -

- Cambridgeshire Constabulary (The Chief Officer of Police)
- Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue (The Fire Authority)
- Health and Safety Team, Peterborough City Council
- Planning authority, Peterborough City Council
- Trading Standards, Peterborough City Council
- Environmental Health – Pollution, Peterborough City Council
- Children's Services – Child Protection & Review Manager
- Primary Care Trust or Local Health Board (Director of Public Health)
- The Relevant Licensing Authority, Peterborough City Council
- Maritime & Coastguard Agency, Walton on Naze. (For vessels carrying more than 12 passengers.)
- Environment Agency, Peterborough (For vessels carrying 12 or less passengers).

'Supply of alcohol':

- the sale by retail of alcohol, or
- the supply of alcohol by or on behalf of a club to, or to the order of, a member of the club.

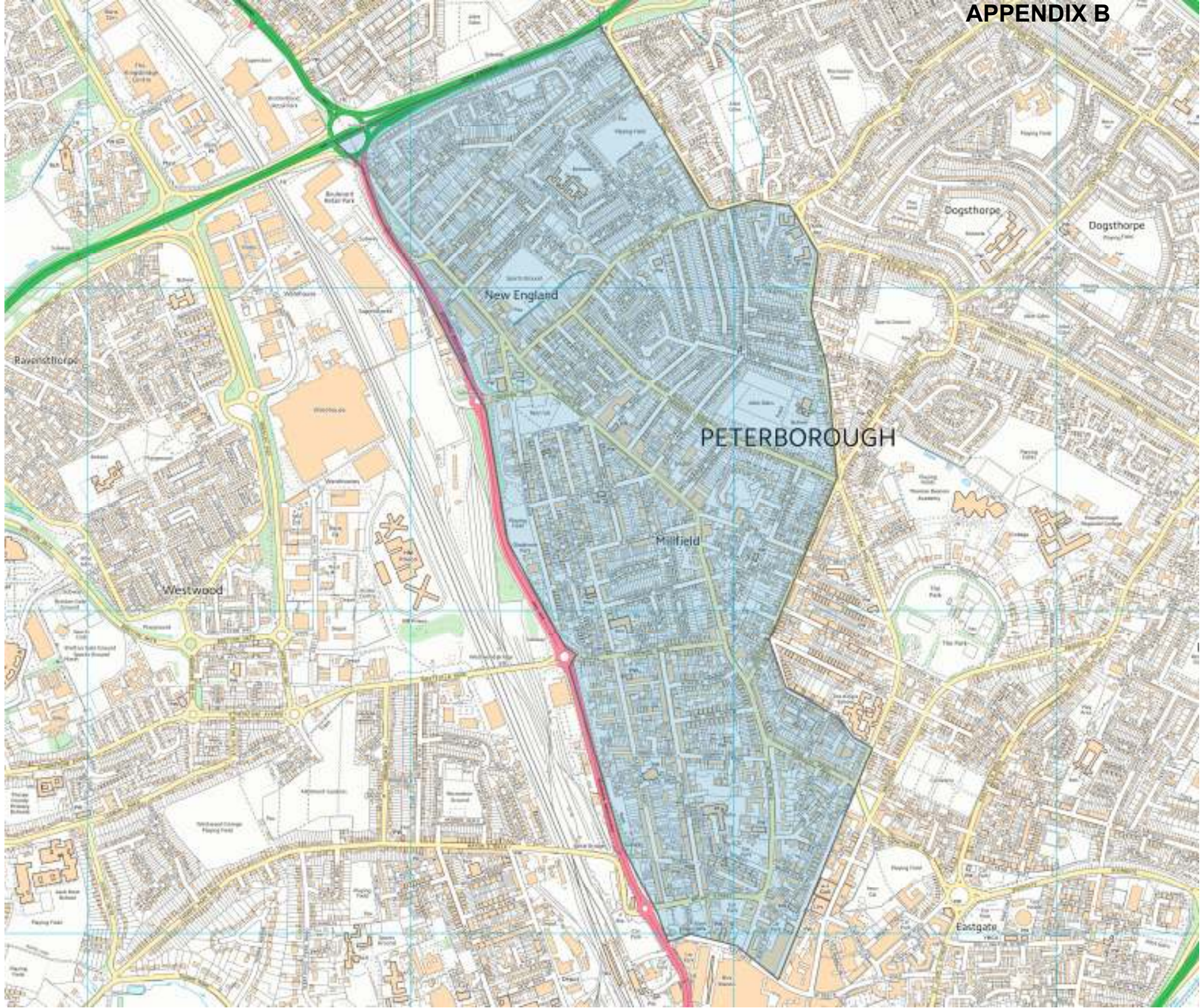
'Temporary Event Notice' means a Permitted Temporary Activity involving one or more Licensable Activities subject to the following various conditions and limitations: -

- Duration – they are limited to events lasting for up to 168 hours (7 days);
- Scale – they cannot involve the presence of more than 499 people at any one time;
- Use of the same premises – the same premises cannot be used on more than 12 occasions in a calendar year, but are subject to the overall aggregate of 21 days irrespective of the number of occasions on which they have been used; and
- The number of notices given by an individual within a given period of time – a Personal Licence Holder is limited to 50 notices in one year and another person to 5 notices in a similar period.

(In any other circumstances, a full Premises Licence or Club Premises Certificate will be required for the period of the event).

'the Act': means the Licensing Act 2003



- **Alcohol available for sale will be restricted between the hours of 08.00 until 23.00.**
- The Licensee will display at all times in close proximity to all alcohol displays within the premises, the current Alcohol guidelines produced by the Chief Medical Officers. (see attached – simple A4 poster).
- **There will be no window display posters or similar advertising containing and reference to alcohol on the premises shop frontage or the highway abutting the premises.**
- Spirits must be displayed and secured behind the sales point and will not be available for self-service.
- **There will be no sales of beer lager, or cider over 6.5% ABV.**
- The licence holder shall operate and maintain a refusals register in respect of declined sales of alcohol where the attempted purchaser was suspected of being under 18 years of age or drunk.
- The refusals register shall be kept on the premises and be made available immediately upon request to an authorised officer of the Police or Local Authority.
- The licence holder will ensure that within six weeks of any appointment of a member of staff, they receive adequate training in responsible alcohol retailing and refreshed every 12 months. A training record will be kept at the premises.
- No alcoholic drinks will be purchased by the store owners or staff from sellers calling at the store. All invoices (originals or copies) for all alcoholic goods for retail sale on the premises will be kept at the shop and made available to Police, Council and HMRC Officers upon request. An ultra-violet light will be available at the premises for the purpose of checking the UK Duty Stamp on all spirits as soon as practical after they have been purchased.
- If any spirits bought by the company have UK Duty Stamps that do not fluoresce under ultra-violet light, or are otherwise suspicious, the licensee shall identify the supplier to Trading Standards department and HMRC as soon as possible.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

- A fully working and maintained CCTV system capable of recording and storing images must be installed on the premises. The system must record at all times the premises is open to the public and images must be stored for a minimum of 28 days with date & time stamping. As a minimum this must cover all entry and exit points, both sides of all areas where the sale/supply of alcohol takes place.
- All recordings must be made available to an officer from a responsible authority upon reasonable request and in line with the provisions of the Data Protection Act 1998.
- All staff involved in the retail of alcohol will be trained in relation to the law regarding its sale. This training must be completed prior to them being authorised to sell alcohol and refreshed every 12 months as a minimum. A record of this training must be kept and maintained with a copy of the syllabus attached. 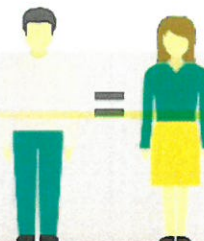

It has been brought to my notice that an application had been submitted for a property currently undergoing conversion at [32 Dogsthorpe Road](#) (see photo, attached).

As one of the ward councillors, and living in the local area, I am strongly opposed to this application.

CRIME & DISORDER

Throughout Park Ward, and particularly in the Millfield area, we are seeing a lot of ASB, much of which is fuelled by the availability of cheap alcohol. If the Cumulative Impact Policy is to mean anything, it needs to put a brake on any further licences being granted.

The Huntly Grove - Granville Street - Dogsthorpe Road area already seen regular disturbances from groups of young men hanging around, drinking and, allegedly, drug dealing. We simply do not need yet another attraction for these type of people.

PUBLIC SAFETY

The Dogsthorpe Road corridor is a busy road, with car parking along its length. The addition of yet another shop, particularly one selling alcohol, will add to the parking and viability problems which, over the years, have contributed to accidents. We now have shops at the junctions of Dogsthorpe Road with All Saints Rd, Princes St, St Martin's St and Huntly Grove.

PUBLIC NUISANCE

I receive a lot of email and phone calls from residents about ASB, drug dealing and littering with bottles and cans. This local area cannot be allowed to decay in this way. Local residents feel increasingly powerless to stop this process, and so I am duty bound to represent their interests in the strongest terms possible.

This area already suffers from a littering flytipping problem, with cans and bottles forming a significant proportion of this rubbish.

PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

The presence of groups of young males hanging around at existing shops in the area, mean that there is a significant risk of this problem growing if a license is granted.

I would like these concerns to form part of the consultation on this particular application. Please can you confirm receipt and ensure that these comments are recorded.

RE: Objection to Notice of Application for a Premises Licence Application, 32 Dogsthorpe Road, Peterborough PE1 3AF – Licencing Act 2003.

We previously lived at [REDACTED] Dogsthorpe Road and now rent the property, which is maintained to a high standard, and we still live in the local area.

We wish to formally object to the above application under the Act on the following grounds under the four licensing objectives and associated reasons.

General comments that relate to all 4 licencing objectives

1. Peterborough was declared an **Alcohol Action Area (AAA) by the Home Office in 2017**. AAAs bring together agencies including Licensing Authorities, Health Bodies, Police and others with businesses to address problems caused by alcohol in their local area. We understand that street drinking is a concern in PE1 and that street wardens are being deployed.
2. There is a **cumulative impact** of large numbers of 'corner' and 'international' stores and chains selling alcohol in close proximity to 32 Dogsthorpe Road, including Lincoln Road, Milfield. Our view is that it would be irresponsible to grant another license in this area.
3. Peterborough has a **higher level of deprivation and child poverty** than the national rate and is ethnically diverse. **Hospital admissions for alcohol-specific conditions** are statistically significantly worse than England (JSNA Peterborough 2017).
4. People living in deprived areas suffer significant **health inequalities** in 'lifestyle' diseases such as cardiovascular disease, diabetes and impacts of alcohol. Deprived areas usually have a greater number of outlets selling high sugar, fat and salt products, tobacco and alcohol. Increased access to these types of outlets is associated with higher consumption.
5. Increasing access to another alcohol outlet will adversely affect the **most vulnerable** in the population. Access to alcohol from 8am to 11pm (15 hr/day), 7 days a week, would encourage consumption by those with **alcohol dependence** and other addictions and health problems.
6. Dogsthorpe Road is in a **Selective Licensing Area (SLA)** which aims 'to improve the quality of life for all in the area by ensuring a consistent high standard of management of private rented homes which thus make a positive contribution to the area'. Criteria for a SLA include; a significant and persistent problem caused by anti-social behaviour, poor property conditions, high levels of migration, high levels of crime and deprivation.
 - a. Granting a license would be in conflict with this.
 - b. As landlords we believe that having a liquor outlet will reduce our ability to attract tenants as families will not want to live near an outlet, thus reducing housing availability for families in the vicinity.

- c. Dogsthorpe Road is predominantly residential with families with children and some elderly people living in our block. Our neighbours, previous tenants and recent viewings were all families with children.

1. Prevention of crime and disorder

The area is saturated with liquor outlets and is likely to worsen alcohol-related crime and disorder in an area which already has problems.

See points above (1). Alcohol Action Area, (2) the cumulative impact

2. Public safety

Availability of another alcohol outlet will increase the risk of loitering close to the premise and alcohol-related violence and antisocial behaviour. Residents may not feel safe.

See points above (1) Alcohol Action Area, (2) the cumulative impact, (5) vulnerable/alcohol dependant and (6) Selective Licensing

3. Prevention of public nuisance

Availability of another alcohol outlet is likely to increase public nuisance in an area and cause material detriment to the enjoyment of our property and that of our neighbours.

See points above (1) Alcohol Action Area, (2) the cumulative impact, (5) vulnerable/alcohol dependant and (6) Selective Licensing

The applicant states that 'persons will be discouraged from congregating outside the premises and that they intend to display a notice to say that 'no alcohol to be consumed directly outside the main entrance of the shop'. This could push the problem outside nearby houses with resultant noise, disruption and litter and cannot be enforced.

The street outside our property is often littered with beer and mixer drink cans and sometimes these are thrown into the front garden.

We have often seen young men walking in front of the house drinking alcohol during the daytime hours.

4. Protection of children from harm

Large numbers of children and families walk past our house and no. 32 each day walking to and from the nearby schools.

See points above (1-6).

In conclusion, we appreciate the good work of Peterborough City Council to improve the health, wellbeing and safety of the area through its Selective Licensing Scheme and Alcohol Action endeavours.

We are not against small business and the previous ladies clothes shop at number 32 was not a problem. Has number 34 been converted to a retail premise?

We call on PCC not to grant any form of alcohol license for the reasons stated above.

We would also like PCC to consider implementing health as a licensing objective (HALO).

I am the Chair of Millfield & New England Regeneration Partnership (MANERP) which represents residents who live in the Millfield and New England and Dogsthorpe Road areas of Peterborough. The reason for writing is to request that the application for a Premises License be refused.

The MANERP area of Peterborough (which includes Dogsthorpe and Lincoln Road), have had for several years a history of anti-social behaviour fuelled by alcohol and drug abuse. This has been exacerbated by the rapid growth of a number of outlets retailing alcohol by means of “off-sales.”

The area is also within the boundary of the “Can-Do” initiative which has brought together the city council, police, NHS, Resident Associations and other partner agencies to jointly combat the serious issues being faced in this area.

It must also be noted that the area is a Cumulative Impact Zone whereby the applicant needs to prove that there is a need for selling alcohol “off sales”. The premises in this application is in close proximity to other businesses retailing “off-sales” alcohol and cannot therefore, prove that there is a need. There are no new developments of any significance being built or planned to the best of our knowledge and therefore this predominantly residential area is in no need of any further alcohol outlets of any sort.

The whole area is very sensitive and volatile because of the ease of access to the purchase of alcohol often sold at a low price in order to attract customers or to be competitive. There are issues regarding anti-social behaviour from youths and young men who tend to conglomerate on the corner where these premises are situated and the granting of an alcohol license is likely to exacerbate the problems.

There are also major parking issues with permit parking covering the immediate proximity of the premises which is also on a main bus and

commuter route going to and from Lincoln Road which is an arterial road into the city.

The Millfield and New England and Can-Do areas have a phenomenal number of outlets selling alcohol “off-sales” (around the seventy plus mark) which has contributed significantly to anti-social behaviour in the area. The current joint partnership between Peterborough City Council, Cambridgeshire Police and other partner agencies through the “Can-Do” initiative has highlighted the need to reduce the number of outlets and hours that alcohol can be freely purchased, if it is to make any headway towards the goals that it is striving to achieve.

With this and the Cumulative Impact Policy in mind, we also make this representation under all of the Licensing Objectives set out in the Licensing Act 2003, namely;

- a) The prevention of crime and disorder
- b) Public safety
- c) The prevention of public nuisance
- d) Protection of children from harm

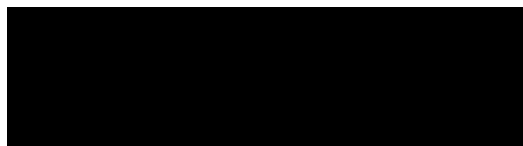
The MANERP’s primary aim is to try to regenerate an area that has been sadly neglected for many years. 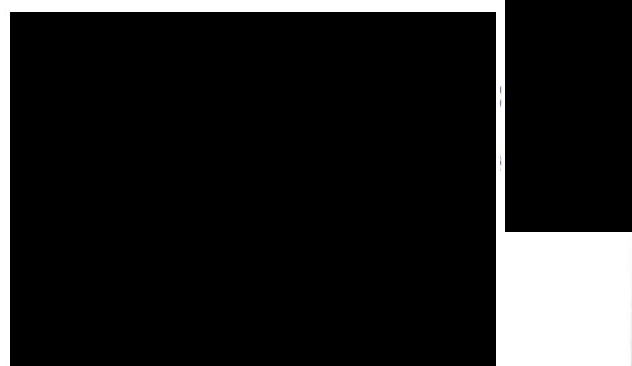

On 27th September 2018 Cambridgeshire Constabulary Licensing Department (Peterborough District) received e-mail notification from Peterborough City Council Licensing Authority of an application for a new Premises License at 32 Dogsthorpe Road, Peterborough, PE1 3AF. The application has been submitted by Licensing Consultant Mr. Paul Byatt of Licensed-Inn-Tuition on behalf of Dins Kolosovskis of 23 College Park, Peterborough, PE1 4AW. The DPS is proposed as Mr. Kolosovskis who is yet to be issued with an alcohol personal license by Peterborough City Council Licensing Authority.

I understand that the applicant wishes to open a new 'Off License' shop and describes it as an International grocery store licensed to sell alcohol. The premises was previously a retail outlet. The hours applied for the sale of alcohol are Monday to Sunday 08:00hrs to 23:00hrs. The supplied plan suggests that at least 30% of the store will be laid over to display alcohol.

This proposed licensed premises is located in a mainly residential area on the central Eastern Edge of the CAN-DO Operational area, on Dogsthorpe Road and ultimately within the Cumulative Impact Area (Special Policy) drawn up and adopted on 18th April 2013. It has been positively identified that there is a significant concentration of licensed premises within the CAN-DO area, and there is sufficient evidence of a negative impact on the statutory objectives. Peterborough City Council's 'Statement of Licensing Policy', 'Special Policy on Cumulative Effect' - Paragraph 11.6 states:

*"This special policy creates a rebuttable presumption that applications within the Op Can Do area for new premises or club premises certificates or **variations** that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, if relevant representations are received about the cumulative impact on the licensing objectives, unless the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will*

not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced”.

Para 11.7 states:

“Applications will need to address the special policy issues in their operating schedules in order to rebut such a presumption”.

The applicant has recognised the Cumulative Impact Area and I am somewhat satisfied that the offered conditions will go some way to address how the sale of alcohol at this premises will not contribute to the existing negative cumulative impact.

However, I am conscious that this retail premises lies in a residential area and does not form part of a commercial area. I would like to see the applicant seriously reconsider the hours applied for and reduce them to reflect 08:00hrs to 21:00hrs on a daily basis.

Furthermore, I have reviewed the conditions offered by the applicant and for the sake of clarity have amended and added further conditions that will support the licensee in upholding the licensing objectives.

If the timing alteration and amended conditions are accepted by the applicant there will be no further representation from the Constabulary.

Constabulary Proposal:

To amend all licensed hours to reflect:

Monday to Sunday: 08:00hrs to 21:00hrs.

Prevention of Crime & Disorder

1. The premises licence holder will ensure that a HD digital CCTV system is fully compliant with the Information Commissioner’s Office (ICO) guidance document (www.ico.org.uk) regarding General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR); and that the relevant Data Controller is registered with the ICO.
2. CCTV will be provided in the form of a recordable system, capable of providing pictures of High definition (HD) evidential quality in all lighting conditions in particular facial recognition. Cameras must cover the entire licensed area including the curtilage of the premises.
3. CCTV equipment must be maintained in good working order, be correctly time and date stamped and must be retained for a minimum period of 28 consecutive days.
4. The premises licence holder must ensure at all times that an appointed member of staff is present when the premises is conducting a licensable activity, who is capable and competent at using the CCTV system and downloading CCTV footage on their own recordable media, and be able to hand this footage over to the Police / Local Authority on request.
5. All images downloaded must be provided in a format that can be viewed on readily available equipment without the need for specialist software.

6. The operator will stock their own downloaded media. The recording equipment and discs/USB pen drives must be kept in a secure environment under the control of the DPS or other responsible named individual.
7. Notices advising that CCTV has been installed on the premises shall be posted up so that they are clearly visible to the public within the licensed premises.
8. A 'Refusals Register' will be kept at the premises and maintained by all staff, detailing declined sales to those suspected of being underage or drunk. The register will include the date and time of the potential sale, what product was refused and a brief description of the person and the name and signature of the person who refused the sale. This register will be produced to a Police Officer / Local Authority Officer upon request.
9. All non APLH qualified staff will be trained immediately with regards to the sale of alcohol under the Licensing Act 2003 prior to making any alcohol sales. This training must be ongoing, documented on relevant training records and made available for inspection by the Police / Local Authority on request.
10. There will be no beer, lager or cider over 6.5% Abv offered for sale at the premises.
11. The Premises License holder, designated premises supervisor and any member of staff or other person connected to the store will not purchase, store or sell alcoholic produce that has not been purchased from a registered alcohol wholesalers.
12. No alcoholic beverage will be purchased by the store owner or staff from sellers calling at the store. All invoices (originals or copies) for all alcoholic goods for retail sale on the premises will be kept at the shop and made available to Police Officer / Authorised Officer on request.
13. If any spirits bought by the company have UK Duty Stamps that do not fluoresce under ultra-violet light, or are otherwise suspicious, the licensee shall identify the supplier to Trading Standards or HMRC.
14. If the premises is to be used for the sale of cigarettes and tobacco produce the licensee and their staff, or any other person connected to the premises will only store and sell legitimate UK duty paid stock carrying current health warnings. Invoices for tobacco produce will be retained at the premises and made available to a Police Officer / Local Authority Officer upon request.

Promote Public Safety

15. Adequate and appropriate first aid equipment and materials must be available on the premises.
16. Valid public liability insurance must be kept in force and a copy of the schedule must be available for inspection by a Police Officer / Local Authority Officer.
17. A fire risk assessment required under the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005 (as amended) will be completed and be available for inspection by an authorised officer.

Prevent Public Nuisance

18. There will be no window display posters or similar advertising containing reference to alcohol on the premises frontage or the highway abutting the premises.
19. No person will be allowed to enter or leave the premises with an open vessel of alcohol and the licensee will proactively discourage persons from congregating at the front of the store.
20. A clear & legible notice will be displayed in a prominent location at the exit from the shop asking customers to respect local residents and to leave the area quietly.
21. Waste collection contractors will not collect refuse from the premises between 21:00hrs and 07:00hrs. Any litter or waste must be contained within the boundary of the premises (as indicated on the plan) and regularly cleared.
22. Receptacles for waste will be placed at the front of the premises, and the front of the premises will be kept litter free. These receptacles will be emptied on a regular basis to avoid public nuisance through smells or odours and shall be maintained in a clean condition.
23. Trade waste containers will only be left out on the day of collection and will be stored off the public right of way at all times.

Protection of children from harm

24. The 'Challenge 21' / 'Challenge 25' initiative to prevent sales of alcohol to persons under 18 years of age will be implemented at the premises and signage will be prominently placed within the premises advertising the fact that the premises operates the 'Challenge 21' / 'Challenge 25' initiative.
25. Any person selling or supplying alcoholic drink or other age restricted product must have received appropriate training, act under the authority of a personal license holder (DPS Authorisation), and must ask for photo ID proof of age where they have reason to believe that the individual may be less than 25 years of age.

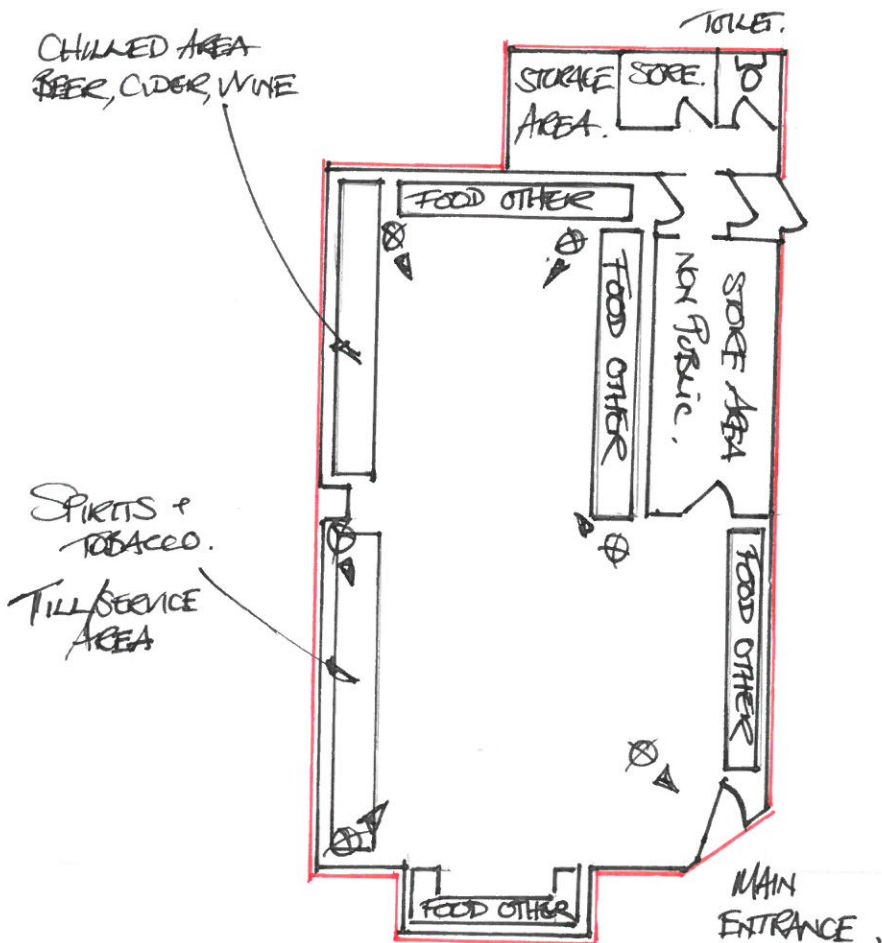
