1.	PURPOSE OF THIS REPORT			
1.1	This report is for the Cabinet Member of Adult Social Care to consider exercising delegated authority under paragraph 3.4.3 of Part 3 of the constitution in accordance with the terms of their portfolio at paragraph (c).

3.	BACKGROUND AND KEY ISSUES			
3.1	This report seeks the Cabinet Member's approval to terminate the existing Section 75 Agreement with Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Clinical Commissioning Group for the Better Care Fund and subsequently to enter into a new Section 75 Agreement.			
3.2	A section 75 agreement between Peterborough City Council and Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Clinical Commissioning Group was entered into in March 2015, following the introduction of the new national Better Care Fund initiative. This was a national requirement of NHS England funding to release Better Care Fund monies into a jointly agreed pooled fund. The section 75 agreement took effect following a CMDN dated 20 March 2015 (ref: KEY/20MAR15/01)			
3.3	The new agreement is necessary to reflect key changes to the Better Care Fund in 2017- 19, including:			
	<ul> <li>Changes to the financial allocations</li> <li>Changes to NHS England nationally mandated conditions</li> <li>Submission of a new Better Care Fund plan for 2017-19 which the Council has only recently been made aware of</li> <li>Updates to local governance arrangements</li> </ul>			
3.4	The financial effect of the new Section 75 Agreement will be an increased contribution into the pooled fund from Peterborough City Council of an additional £4,027,686 in 2017/18 and £5,548,853 in 2018/19 (as a result of the uplift to the Disabled Facilities Grant allocation and the introduction of the new Improved Better Care Fund allocation from the Department of Communities and Local Government (DCLG)).			
3.5	Section 75 of the National Health Service Act 2006 gives powers to local authorities and clinical commissioning groups to establish and maintain pooled funds out of which payment may be made towards expenditure incurred in the exercise of prescribed local authority functions and prescribed NHS functions.			
3.6	The purpose of the Section 75 of the 2006 Act is to set out the terms on which the Partners have agreed to collaborate and to establish a framework through which the Partners can secure the future position of health and social care services through lead or joint commissioning arrangements for the City of Peterborough. It is also the means through which the Partners will pool funds as agreed between the Partners.			
3.7	The aims and benefits of the Partners in entering in to the Section 75 Agreement are to:
